Resolution Adopted by Farmers Union 1940 Convention

WHEREAS, the constitution of the State of Oregon, as amended in 1913, provides for a double liability assessment on the stockholders of state banks in the event of the failure of any state bank organized after that date, and

WHEREAS, only 28 of the 48 state-chartered banks now operating in the State of Oregon are effected by this double liability because the remaining 20 state banks were organized prior to the enactment of the law in 1913, and are therefore not effected by said law, and

WHEREAS, in 38 of the other states, double liability on stock in state banks has been eliminated or has never existed, and

WHEREAS, the National Banking law of 1935 has provided for the elimination of the double liability on the stockholders of national banks, thus leaving the existence and organization of independent community state chartered banks in an unfair position with national banks having branches in this state, and

WHEREAS, deposits in practically all commercial banks in the state of Oregon are insured up to \$5,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, making it unnecessary to have double liability on bank stocks, and

WHEREAS, many farmers are stockholders in state banks and as such are discriminated against unjustly by this law, and

WHEREAS, the legislature of the State of Oregon has referred this issue to the voters of the state to be passed upon at the next general election in November of this year.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Farmers' Union in Convention assembled record in favor of the repeal of the law that provided for double liability on the stockholders of state banks.
