Governor Sprague Names Ten to Selective Service Advisory Board Posts

Formation of boards, composed of judges and lawyers, in each of the 17 judicial districts of Oregon to act as advisors for Selective Service registrants, was announced by Governor Charles A. Sprague.

Governor Sprague named 57 members of the state bar as advisory board members, one representing each Selective Service local board area, but stated that it was expected that each member appointed by him will appoint associate members. Virtually the entire bar of the state will thus give assistance to registrants, he pointed out.

For administrative purposes the advisors are grouped on a board for each judicial district of the state and the senior or presiding circuit judge of the district will act as chairman.

Duties of the advisory board members will be to assist in furnishing advice and aid to registrants in completing their questionnaires. The questionnaires form the means by which local classification and selection boards obtain information upon which to base the classification of registrants and it is highly important that the questionnaires be filled out completely and accurately. It was declared by Lt. Col. Elmer V. Wooten, state director for Selective Service, following a conference with Governor Sprague to set up the advisory board machinery. The local boards themselves are not permitted to assist registrants in completing questionnaires.

Check Car Now for Wet Weather Safety

Recent rainfall served as a reminder to motorists that this is a time when it is wise to check the condition of the car in preparation for the approaching season of more frequent wet weather, it is pointed out by the public safety department of the Oregon State Motor association.

Emphasized by the motorists organization was the fact that a rise in traffic accidents occur regularly every fall and winter, indicating a need not only for careful driving but for making certain that various safety features of the car are in dependable shape.

The importance of good brakes, tires and lights was stressed in a series of suggestions, as follows: Check the lights regularly and carry extra light bulbs. Efficient lights, free from glare, are more necessary as the days shorten and the amount of night driving increases. Incidentally, remember that the law now requires use of the lower beams when other cars approach.

Have brakes in good order, but keep speed down to a point which will permit normal and safe use of brakes. In other words, avoid the necessity of sudden and excessive braking because of the danger of skidding on wet surfaces.

Tires worn smooth are an added hazard in wet weather and should be replaced with well-treaded ones. Keep the windshield wiper in proper working condition. "Take time to be safe in wet weather," the automobile club statement added. "Allowing a little extra time for reaching a destination is one of the things which help to avoid accidents during the winter months."

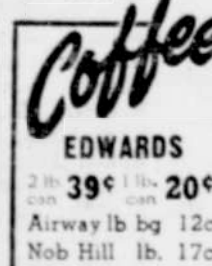
