No Blackouts Here

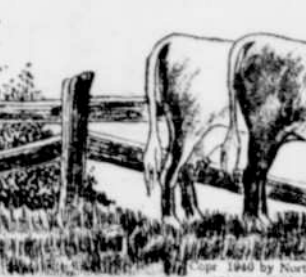
