Washington county's 1941 budget was passed without change Monday at a public hearing in the county court rooms; the budget calls for an expenditure of \$408,871.30 to be raised by taxation.

An interesting article appeared in a Portland paper in regard to the historic hanging of 38 Sioux Indians in Mankato, Minn., 78 years ago.

Mrs. M. E. Pike, aged 88 years, is the oldest and the longest time resident in Beaverton, coming here 62 years ago. Mrs. Pike, then only 10 years of age, was an eye witness to this hanging, and is probably the only person now living who witnessed this historic hanging. Her daughter, Mary Evelyn Young, wrote the article as given to her by her mother, who in spite of her age, has a very keen memory and relates to her friends many of her early day experiences.
