

Nyberg Wins Top Honors in State Corn Competition

A young man who spent seven years growing corn as a 4-H club project, emerged with the sweepstakes trophy at the fourth annual Oregon State Corn show held in Corvallis.

Clayton Nyberg, 22, of Tualatin, exhibited 20 ears of hybrid corn of Wisconsin 525 variety, which placed first in his district, won the championship of the hybrid class, and then went on to take sweepstakes over all classes. His entry had been selected from an acre of corn which yielded 112 bushels as measured by a disinterested party, although the yield did not figure in the award won.

This year's show was probably more widely attended than any yet held, and the quality of corn was unusually high, according to Oregon State college representatives who staged the show and did the judging. The show was sponsored jointly by Oregon farm organizations, Portland business interests, the state department of education, at Oregon State college.

The hybrid corn growing contest, in which yield and costs of production are considered, and in which three acres are a minimum requirement, was won this year by F. S. Green of Stanfield, with a yield of 125.69 bushels per acre, produced at a cost of only 19.5 per bushel. L. O. Gorman of Crabtree won in western Oregon with a yield of 67.16 bushels per acre, at a cost of 26.8 cents per bushel.

C. A. Marsh of Hillsboro retained his title in the state corn shucking contest by shucking 211.9 pounds net in 19 minutes. Marsh, a former Iowa corn grower, also won the corn growers' judging contest. In the shucking contest shocked corn was husked on a roped-off street.

Class champions in the five classes of the show were: Class 1 (open) E. G. Wiesner, Brooks; class 2 (hybrids) Clayton Nyberg, Tualatin; class 3 (hybrid corn production) F. S. Green, Stanfield; class 4 (4-H clubs) Bill Sperr, Canby, and class 5 (FFA) Jack Heinz, Molalla.

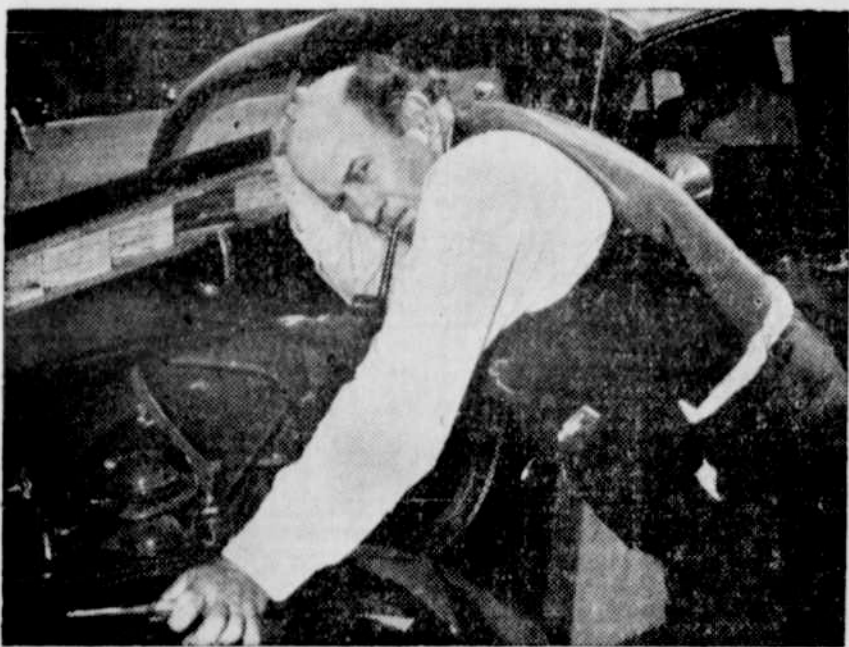

Washington News Letter Written By Congressman Homer D. Angell

Congress Should Work and Not Engage in a Sit-Down Strike—Congress, by formal vote, determined that it would remain in session. In doing so it showed wisdom. However it should not only remain in session but should devote itself to clearing the decks of important business which is awaiting action. There is much that can be done in the remaining days of the 76th Congress. Speaking on this subject before the House on November 25, 1940, I expressed my views on the subject and among other things, said:

"I urge that we all lay aside all partisanship and with unity of purpose begin today with full speed ahead to rebuild our America—strong and secure. Let the Congress point the way. Let it set the example. Let us not be slackers we are now. We are engaged in a sit-down strike against our Government. We are refusing to work, but we are drawing our pay. We have by our votes conspired the young manhood of our Nation to go into camp and prepare to fight to defend America—to give their lives if necessary—yet we sit snugly by and refuse to raise a hand to stamp out sabotage in the war industries that they may have guns and munitions and ships and clothing and food. A day of reckoning will come. We will have to answer for our folly. Let us awake now before it is too late. America is calling to us. Will we heed the call?"

Congress Meets in New Quarters—Owing to the fact that the House and Senate chambers are undergoing repairs to the roof it is necessary for Congress to meet in other quarters. The Capitol architect for a long time has felt that the heavy roof over the House and Senate chambers is dangerous and may fall in the event of a heavy snow. In order to meet these repairs the sessions must be held elsewhere. The House is meeting in the Ways and Means Committee room and the Senate is meeting in the old Senate chamber which was lately used by the Supreme Court until the Court moved into its new building. While these facilities are not entirely adequate they will serve

the purpose until these needed repairs can be made.

WPA Project for Improving Canyon Road—This project was sponsored by the Oregon State Highway Commission. The allotment made is \$21,037. The improvements will consist in improving the highway including landscaping, grading, transplanting trees and shrubs, constructing guard-rails, riprapping bank, providing roadside drainage and parking spaces, excavating, and performing appurtenant and incidental work. Publicly owned property.

Senate Considers Logan Walter Bill—Many months ago the House passed the so-called Logan Walter Bill. This is much needed legislation. It provides for a Court review of actions taken by Bureaus and Departments of Government. Under the complicated set-up which now prevails, many decisions are made by these bureaus and departments which are not only administrative but which are judicial in their nature. They involve property rights which have to do with the welfare of our citizens. There should be an opportunity for a review of these decisions by a duly constituted court. This bill, if enacted into law, will provide such a remedy. The Senate has now determined to take up for consideration, and final passage this much needed legislation.

Supt. Dugdale Appointed On Vocational Committee

Superintendent Ralph E. Dugdale received notification last Saturday of his appointment to the all-western committee of the American Vocational association. He will participate in the annual convention of the group to be held in San Francisco on December 15 to 19. More than 3000 delegates have registered for the "shop talk" sessions.

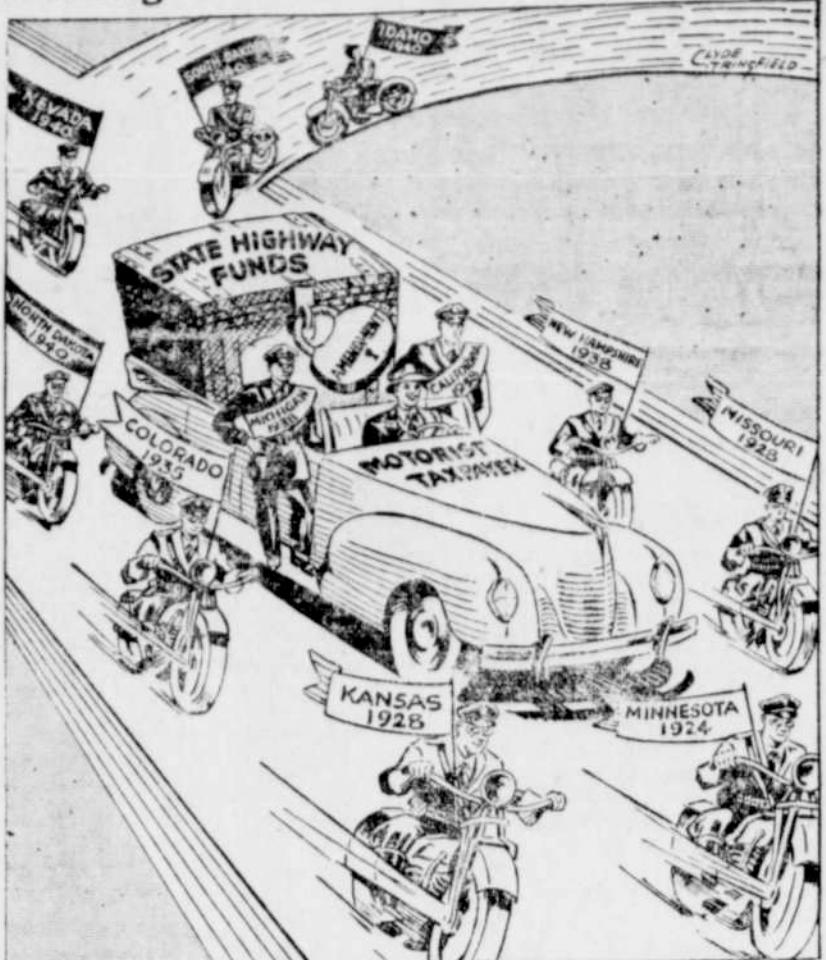
