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## REMEMBERING THE RIGHTS OF CITIZENS

### Remembering the Rights of Citizens

For those who follow affairs in Washington with any interest—and surely all good citizens should do so—there is one recent happening that should be a source of real encouragement. We have in mind the fact that Congress has given such serious consideration to the Walter-Logan Bill. Whatever the ultimate fate of that measure, the fact that the legislators gave their time to it, just now is a genuinely comforting sign.

For these are troubled world times. And the natural tendency is to forget completely about the very ideals we are trying to defend in our excitement about defending them.

Congress, in going to bat on the Walter-Logan Bill, sharply reversed that trend. For this particular piece of legislation is aimed at protecting certain of the basic rights of American citizens. It allows for court review of a great many of the decisions rendered by the tremendous flock of new quasi-judicial, quasi-executive, and quasi-judicial agencies of our federal government which are in no way responsible directly to the people.

In the past, certain of these agencies—most notably, the Wagner Labor Relations Board—have been inclined to cut corners in neglecting the rights of the citizenry. In the most flagrant cases, courts have usually been able to temper the decisions imposed by this particular board. But a wider right to court review would be a powerful assertion of the principles in the Bill of Rights.

As we say, it is encouraging to know that Congress still believes in the importance of domestic issues and the protection of the civil rights of Americans. It is a further sign that this representative democracy of ours is not only strong enough but intelligent enough to guard its basic liberties in the midst of a world at war.

Banks with funds of depositors to invest are still attracted to the commercial paper of large concerns at rates of one-half to one per cent. Most of our bank officials have forgotten that the present size of many of our institutions was brought about by the faith and interest their predecessors showed in the small business man and small concern. ## North Portland Livestock Market News

Monday's fat lamb sales were around 25 c lower, while slaughter ewes cashed at steady prices. Good to choice woolled lambs sold at \$8.25 to \$8.50 mainly, with one sizeable lot at \$8.65 and one carload at \$8.70. Common lambs sold around \$6.75 to \$7.25. Good to choice shorn lambs made \$7.50 to \$7.75. A few good slaughter ewes made \$4 to \$4.50, with common to medium grades around \$2 to \$3.50.

**CATTLE:** Good grain-fed steers \$9.75 to \$10.50. Short fed steers \$8.75 to \$9.50. Good grain fed heifers \$8.25 to \$8.65. Good grass heifers \$7.50 to \$8. Good beef cows \$6.50 to \$7, medium \$5.50 to \$6.25, common \$4.25 to \$4.75, canners \$3 to \$3.75. Bulls, medium to good \$6.25 to \$7, common \$5 to \$5.75. Vealers, good to choice \$9 to \$9.50.

**HOGS:** Good to choice car lots \$6.40; 170 to 215 lb truckins \$6.25 to \$6.35; 230 to 285 lb butchers \$5.50 to \$5.75; packing sows \$3.50 to \$4.25. Feeder pigs \$4 to \$4.50.

**SHEEP:** Good to choice woolled lambs \$8.25 to \$8.70; medium to good \$7.75 to \$8; common \$6.75 to \$7.25. Slaughter ewes, good to choice \$4 to \$4.50. Feeder lambs good to choice \$7 to \$7.50. Shorn lambs \$7.50 to \$7.75.
