Favorite Recipes

Always keep canned beets under liquid—when reheating—to retain red color.

SPINACH

Everyone will like spinach if it is dressed up a bit. One can add bits of chopped sauteed bacon, chopped onion and a dash of lemon juice, pack in mold filled with cooked spinach, and reheat.

Or drop a small bud of garlic into cooked spinach. Remove before serving.

Hot Tomato Cabbage Saw—Cook shredded cabbage uncovered in boiling tomato juice—1 quart shredded raw cabbage, 1½ c tomato juice, ½ t salt. Cook 15 or 20 minutes, add 1 T butter, 2½ t sugar.

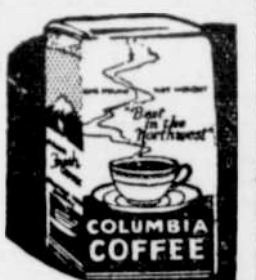
