Sweet Potato Muffins

Combine with dry ingredients, add 1/2 c melted shortening. Pour into greased muffin pans. Bake 30 min., 400 deg. Makes 15.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER
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United States a great favor by revealing a dreadful and vitally dangerous weakness in our defense that has up to this time been concealed from us by our military authorities and the Administration. This responsible say, this statement by the responsible British labor leader, member of the British Privy Council, and authority on defense mechanism, comes almost on the heels of a statement by Major General Parton K. Yount, of the Army Air Corps, on December 7, stating that recent Press criticisms of the United States military airplanes as inferior to present day German and British machines are ill-founded. General Yount had just returned from a 5 weeks visit to England. This development seems to add strong argument to the demand in Congress for a Congressional inquiry into the whole state of our national defense.
