Dies Committee on Un-American Activities—The threat of "Fifth Columnists" to industrial defense activities have caused the Dies Committee on Un-American Activities to ask for a broad legislative program aimed against such threats. To this same end, many members of the House have also introduced bills. One such bill plans to make all crews on American ships members of the Naval Reserve in order to break the present Communist hold on American shipping. I favor the extension of the Dies Committee and the appropriation of sufficient funds to carry on its activities.

77th Congress is expected to continue with little rest for the duration of its term—From all present indications, the problem of national defense, is expected to be the most important work of this Congress. How to make it go faster—how to finance it—and how its results shall be used in the critical world situation—these problems will be attacked at once in an effort to give this nation the vital defense it may need in this war-crazed world.

American People show that Democracy Can Work—The American people have shown that they are capable of putting their shoulders to the wheel when the occasion arises and working co-operatively for the common good. Despite propaganda from abroad, they have shown that democracy can work and without the spiritual sacrifice demanded of subjects living in dictator nations. We have preserved our fundamental democratic rights and concepts while at the same time striving to keep alive these same ideals throughout the world. The year 1941 should bring with it more of this same democratic cooperative spirit which has been typical of the American people down through the ages.

Beware of Politicians
We need not only have fewer laws and to insist on their enforcement, but we should not obstruct the working of natural law. Much of the trouble, from which we suffer, is due to such obstruction. This only postpones the inevitable punishment for not heeding natural law. This situation has been due partly to the shortsightedness of welfare workers, but largely to the desire of politicians to get votes "by hook or by crook."

I have in mind such misleading practices as lending money to dying industries, exempting from taxation factories which are wrongly located, or enacting tariffs to keep alive certain industries where nature never intended them to operate. Tariffs to protect industries in their initial stages are justified; but the subsidizing of industries which—whatever their age—would perish without a subsidy is foolish.

Pull With the Tide
Inventions, scientific discoveries, and new methods of distribution should be encouraged. To penalize such progress by licensing requirements, unnecessary taxation, and other handicaps is bucking natural law. Price fixing to keep alive the anthracite coal business in its competition with oil, gas, and electricity is illustrative of such attempts. Refusing to allow the railroads to scrap 20% of their mileage, when motor coaches, trucks, and airplanes can

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better handle 20% of the nation's transportation, is bucking natural progress.

Government would be justified in helping people now engaged in declining industries to move to other localities. It even might be wise to subsidize such employees and employers for a limited period while making a change of occupation. It should, however, be honest with people and not hold out false hopes.

Avoid Bucking Progress

Our country has encouraged agriculture in almost every manner. It is the one industry recognized with membership in the Presidents' Cabinet. Farmers have privileges and subsidies not enjoyed by any other group. As a result, the raising of certain crops, fruit, and livestock has been overdone. The most serious mistake has been the cultivation of marginal land. Too many struggling people are trying to raise cattle on land meant only for timber; to raise crops or fruit on land suitable only for grazing. The sooner they give up the fight, the better for their character, health, and pocketbook. Government is justified in aiding these people to change their occupation; in taking over and turning this marginal land back to purposes for which God made it. But is it fair to kid these poor people longer by loans?

Political opposition to large units in industry, agriculture, and distribution is bucking natural law. It seems too bad to see small nations wiped out, small farms consolidated, and out-of-date industries closed down, but this may be in accordance with natural law. Government should prevent monopolies from taking unfair advantage of consumers, workers, or competitors. The attitude, however, that a thing is wrong merely because it is "big" is a great mistake. Let me add that the Democracies can win against the Totalitarianism only by encouraging, rather than discouraging, efficiency in industry, agriculture, and distribution.

Conclusion

I know that the giving up of your lifework is very hard—it is almost like burying a favorite child. I really hate to write this message, and even hope I am wrong. All I am doing is asking some of you to think it over—honestly and fearlessly—just as you would if a doctor told you of a cancer which must be cut out if you expect to live.

JOSEPH LANE
FIRST TERRITORIAL GOVERNOR OF OREGON MARCH 3, 1849 — JUNE 18, 1850. HE WAS VERY POPULAR WITH THE PEOPLE AND AFTER SERVING LESS THAN TWO YEARS AS TERRITORIAL GOVERNOR HE WAS ELECTED TERRITORIAL DELEGATE TO CONGRESS. HE SERVED IN THAT OFFICE UNTIL 1853 WHEN HE WAS ELECTED UNITED STATES SENATOR FROM OREGON. IN 1860 LANE WAS NOMINATED FOR VICE PRESIDENT OF THE U.S. ON THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY.

OREGON'S WILD LIFE

Oregon Counties to Share Surplus Vehicle Revenue

The surplus motor vehicle revenue for 1940 will give Oregon counties \$2,410,961.39 to share. In addition to the \$2,000,000 already allotted, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell. This is the largest amount of surplus motor vehicle revenues ever to be distributed to counties.

The motor vehicle receipts for 1940 aggregated \$15,356,441.97. Of this amount \$2,900,537.53 was received from motor vehicle registrations, \$11,301,492.45 from the motor vehicle fuels tax, \$1,124,120.35 from motor vehicle carriers and \$30,291.64 from fines. Most of these receipts go into the state highway fund.

Apportionment for Multnomah county is \$744,894.38 and Washington county \$87,565.28.
