

Selective Service Men Requested to Bring Only Essential Personal Items

Salem, Ore., Jan. 31—(Special)—Men selected for induction into the armed forces can take essential personal equipment with them, but they may not take motor vehicles, Lt. Colonel Elmer V. Wooten, state director of Selective Service, stated today in answer to inquiries from Oregon men included in the 351 January selectives.

The War Department has ruled that men inducted into the service under the Selective Service Act may not travel by private automobile from the induction station to the reception center. Local boards furnish train or bus transportation from local board headquarters to induction stations and the Army furnishes transportation from that point to the reception center.

One reason for the rule against private cars, it is pointed out, is that selectees are not assigned to any particular unit of the Army until after a short stay at the reception center. After being assigned and reaching their unit, selectees may have cars for the commanding officer of the post or camp to which they are assigned grants permission.

Personal equipment which can be taken should not exceed that which can be carried in a handbag or suitcase, it was announced. While no specific instructions have been issued as to what personal equipment should be taken it is recommended that selectees take with them the following: Toilet kit consisting of razor, shaving brush, shaving soap, tooth brush, toothpaste, comb, towel, soap, and small mirror; extra underwear and socks.

The license fees for licensable dogs over the age of eight months and for such dogs owned or kept within the State of Oregon over 30 days for the year 1941 are:

- MALE DOG \$1.50
FEMALE DOG \$1.00
SPAYED FEMALE DOG \$1.00

After March 1st, 1941, the license fee is \$1.00 more for failure to procure license for dogs above the stated. Also, after March 1st, 1941, the fee is \$1.00 more for failure to procure license for licensable dogs becoming over 8 months of age after March 1st, 1941, and for dogs over eight months old owned or kept within the State of Oregon over 30 days after March 1st, 1941.

Licenses may be ordered by mail. State the name and address of the person to whom the license is to be issued, and the sex of the dog. Fees are payable to W. A. TUPPER, County Clerk Hillsboro, Oregon.
