The Highway to Safety

Oregon stands ready to shoulder its burden in building roads to keep pace with modern warfare. In the files of the state highway commission at Salem are surveys worked out to the smallest details. They hold the plans for removing the twisting loops of our mountain roads, the sharp curves of our older ones. They plan the changing of routes to save many miles and the rebuilding of bridges that are weak or too narrow.

All this preparation for highways improvement came to light when the Oregon State Motor association started its current commendable study to determine the needs and the cost of converting the highways of the state to military standards.

Down through the years the motorists have borne the cost of building our fine network of roads. They have paid their license fees, and there were days when automobile plates were really expensive. They have paid again in taxes at the gasoline pump. They have stood behind \$48,000,000 in highway bonds, bonds that have been trimmed to \$16,000,000 with the motorists' funds.

It is not pleasant to think of troops rushing about on our highways and roaring across our bridges in panzer divisions. But if that time ever comes we want our roads to serve us well. We do not want "bottlenecks" to harass our soldiers and our munition convoys.

Now is the time to prepare. Roads take years to build. This military construction work should be rushed and to do it the federal government must pay a greater share. It must give Oregon more funds because the emergency is national and more of the burden cannot be placed on the shoulders of the motorist who has been so willing to pay down through the years for highways of peace.
