

## Services Held For Thirty-One Jurors Highway Builder Named For March

Samuel C. Lancaster, 77, highway engineer who aided in locating and directing construction of the Columbia River highway, died Tuesday morning at his home in Portland, following a month's illness.

Born at Magnolia, Miss., January 11, 1864, he came to Oregon in 1906, when there was not a foot of paved highway outside of any city on the Coast. During the course of exploratory trips, he was much taken by the beauty of the Columbia gorge, and it was largely his word-picture of its scenic possibilities that persuaded Sam Jackson of The Journal and Sam Hill of the Great Northern railroad to get behind the proposed highway.

Mr. Lancaster located the route, taking advantage of every viewpoint, and aided in supervising construction during the rest of his life he was the Columbia River highway was the major work of his career active in extolling its beauties and protecting it from encroachment.

Regarded as an authority on highway construction and engineering, he had also planned and directed the work of constructing the boulevard system in Seattle, directed the park and hotel development project of the Union Pacific in Utah and Northern Arizona and served as highway consultant in Delaware.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Samuel C. Lancaster; three daughters, Christine Lancaster, Portland; Mrs. A. C. Rose, Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Ray B. McMinn, Portland; two brothers, John L. Lancaster, Dallas, Texas, president of the Texas & Pacific railroad, and C. S. Lancaster, Memphis, Tenn., and a sister, Mrs. J. E. Ryley, Wichita, Kansas.

Pagg's Mortuary of Beaverton, were in charge of funeral arrangements and services were held at Finley's Morninglight chapel Thursday. Burial was in Rose City cemetery.
