

Tree Planters Should Order Stock Immediately

Salem, Oregon, March 7.—Farmers who intend to establish woodlots, spring should submit their orders for windbreaks or shelterbelts, this tree seedlings by the first of March, according to State Forester N. S. Rogers. Indications point to an early spring in the Willamette Valley, according to the forester, which will mean the development of the new spring growth in the seedlings several weeks prior to that of a normal season. As soon as the growth starts it is useless to ship trees, for few of them will survive the digging and transplanting.

The Oregon Forest Nursery is maintained by the State Forestry Department primarily for the benefit of the farmers of the state who desire to go into farm forest planting. A large variety of forest tree seedlings is grown which make it possible to secure trees that are adapted to practically all climatic and soil conditions of both eastern and western Oregon and will also meet most requirements of the farm home along the lines of forest use and forest products.

For eastern Oregon there is a selection of nine different conifers and four hardwoods. The former include the well-known eastern Oregon variety of Douglas fir and the ponderosa pine. Other less familiar trees include the Austrian, Scotch, and cluster pines, the Chinese arbutus and eastern red cedar. Among the hard-

woods is the black locust, which is the most desirable of all tree for the production of posts. Other hardy varieties available include the Russian olive, Chinese elm and caragana.

Information concerning the available species and instructions relative to ordering and planting can be secured by sending a letter to the State Forester in Salem, Oregon, or by getting in touch with the local county agent.

State High School Students Eligible for College Scholarships

Students of the local high school are eligible for scholarships, to be available for three outstanding high school graduates of the state next year at the University of Oregon. It was announced by Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration. Scholarship funds are the gift of the Oregon Mother's organization.

One of these will be for \$200, and the other two for \$150 each, according to information from Mrs. C. C. Wintermute, Portland, president of the Oregon Mothers.

The awards will be made on the basis of outstanding promise as a university student, with the actual need for financial assistance an important consideration. Applications should be filed by March 1.

Preliminary selections will be made on the basis of application and correspondence, and final awards will be made after personal interviews with members of the scholarship committee. Those on the committee include: Dr. Astrid M. Williams, professor of languages; Rudolf H. Ernst, professor of English, and Dean Onthank.

Previous holders of these scholarships have made outstanding records at the university. The funds are raised by the Mother's clubs in communities in all parts of the state.
