Mrs. Chandlee of Sherwood Backed by Federation

Washington County Federation of Women's Clubs is preenting Mrs. William B. Chandlee of Sherwood president, for the second year, of the Scholls Women's club, as its candidate for financial secretary of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs.

The state organization will elect new officers at its 1941 convention in June at Corvallis.

The Washington county group voted in January to back Mrs. Chandlee, but withheld her name when the Silverton Women's club announced Mrs. Ansel P. Solie's candidacy for the same office.

When Mrs. Solie decided during the week end to withdraw her name, the county federation announced the immediate launching of its campaign in Mrs. Chandlee's behalf.

An active club worker in both her own club and in her county organization, Mrs. Chandlee is serving now, too, as chairman of A merican citizenship for the state federation, a post to which she was appointed last fall to fill a vacancy.

She has been a very successful music chairman for the Washington county organization for the last three years, staging several musical matinees in Hillsboro and Forest Grove to raise a music scholarship for a county high school graduate at Pacific university.

Music has been encouraged in clubs of Washington county and through Mrs. Chandlee's efforts a chorus will be entered from her club in the contest scheduled for the state convention this year.

Tualatin Valley Electric Offer Valley Housewife New Model G-E Ranges
