

Mattress Project Offers Opportunity To Learn Trade

Eligible families who fail to take advantage of the opportunity to get a really good mattress through the surplus cotton mattress making program are missing an opportunity to improve home living conditions, according to R. Glen Ritchey, member of the Washington county AAA committee. Washington county has an opportunity to be benefitted generally by this program in the opinion of Ritchey. Those people who obtain mattresses through this program will be benefitted and others in the county should remember that in 1940 Washington county shipped approximately 16 million pounds of winter legume seeds to farmers in the cotton growing areas of the south.

Cotton used in these mattresses will be supplied by the surplus commodity marketing administration. Under this plan it is proposed to set up centers for mattress construction in communities where the number of accepted applications warrants such action. These centers will be under the supervision of community chairmen who assist in planning for and arranging the center. For each mattress an eligible family will receive 50 pounds of cotton plus 10 yards of cotton ticking if they will agree to come to the center and construct the mattress with the assistance of trained leaders. Certain small equipment is provided by the families and other larger equipment by the center. The actual expense to the cooperating family has been set for Washington county at one dollar per mattress. There is of course the labor involved in the construction process.

There are three groups of families that are eligible. First is the true farm family; that is, the family whose income is derived entirely from the farm. Second, is the family whose income is derived partly from the farm and partly from work or jobs done away from the farm. Third, is the non farm family whose income is derived entirely from non farm sources. In the first two groups the income is figured on a net basis while in the latter group it is figured on a gross basis.

Imported Romney Rams Brought to Valley

Sheepmen and agricultural leaders were on hand recently to view arrival in Salem of two Romney-Marsh rams imported from New Zealand for Clarence Bishop of the Pendleton Woolen mills. Bishop purchased the rams for breeding purposes, with, of course, the wool production uppermost in mind in his choice of breed.

The rams, one and two years old, are the second Romneys imported into the Willamette valley from New Zealand. They were selected for Bishop by Prof. J. F. Wilson, wool specialist at the College of Agriculture, Davis, Calif., while Wilson was in New Zealand this winter.

Among the sheepmen on hand at the depot when the rams were unloaded was William Riddell of Monmouth, who brought the first Romneys from New Zealand into the Willamette Valley in 1904.

The rams were taken direct to Bishop's farm near Newberg.

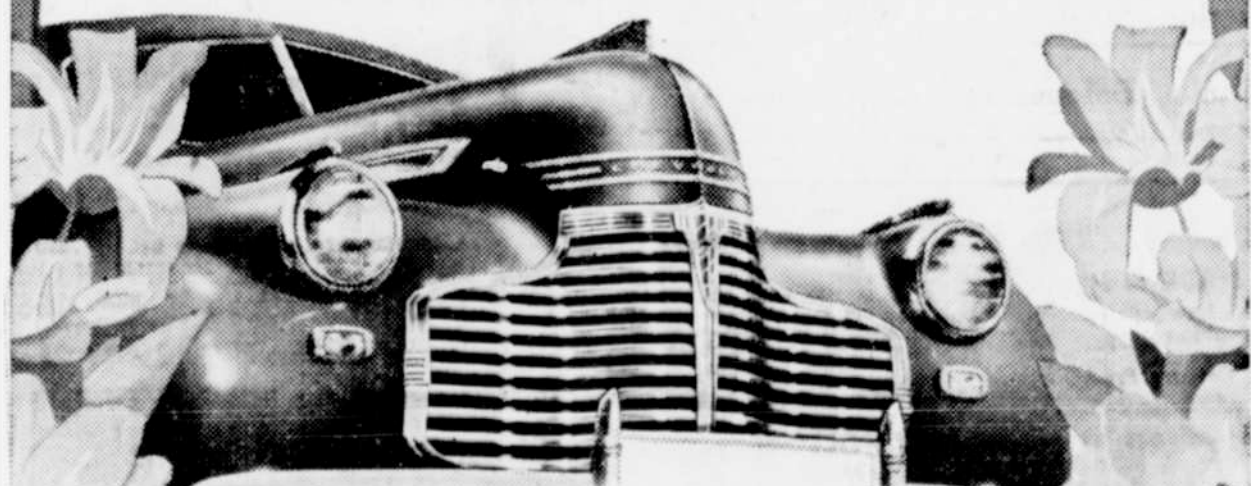
