R. I. Mac Laughlin Cannery Operating Two Schedules

R. I. MacLaughlin and company, local berry-canning and packing plant, is now operating on a full time day and night schedule, according to J. V. Chandler and other officials of the establishment.

Starting May 14 on a night work schedule, the plant now operates on a 24-hour shift with a full working crew of about 60 employees. The principal crop at present is strawberries, as the company limits its packing operations to the various berry crops grown locally. The plant receives strawberries from about 600 acres of the total of 4000 acres grown in Washington county, Mr. Chandler reported.

The berries are packed in containers ranging in size from one-pound cans to 50-gallon barrels. A large quantity is placed in cold storage in Portland, it was revealed.

Renovated from a milling plant three years ago the present plant of R. I. MacLaughlin and company is now in its third year of operation.

But Jimmie, who Saturday, May 31st, and Tuesday, June 3rd, headlines at McElroy's Spanish Ballroom, Portland, is living proof that with the proper application, it is possible to exchange a college sheepskin for a baton, and carve out a successful career.

How Jimmie traded in his high school professorship for a career as a bandmaster, makes quite a story. Upon graduation from Fisk he was given a music professorship at Manassa high school in his own town, Memphis, Tenn. There he became the instructor and faculty adviser of a coterie of student jazz lads. But because he had grown fond of his group, and also because he saw their latent genius for music, he earned enough money for himself and his boys by playing dance dates as a sideline.

Through lean days at first and to days of glory later, five of his original nine boys strung along with Jimmie. They are Edwin Wilcox, piano; James Crawford, drums; Willie Smith, saxophone; Moses Allen, bass; Earl Carruthers, saxophone; and Lunceford.
