Loop Trip Via Bridge of the Gods

Memorial Day coming on Friday, provides for a three day vacation weekend for many of us. This brings up the question of where to go for an enjoyable trip for the whole family.

One of the most enjoyable trips ever taken by the writer started out Base Line Road, following along the high banks of the Sandy to the River Crossing joining the Columbia highway. Then leisurely trip over this beautiful road, with casual stops at the various falls and scenic points. A stop at Bonneville Dam to view the beautiful grounds and the mad rush of water over the spillway. The water is at its high peak now and spills over the top of the dam in torrents. Then a stop at Bonneville Fish hatchery to inspect the trout and bring back memories of the time that big one was hooked and just barely got away.

Driving on along the new wide highways to Cascade Locks and crossing over the 135 foot high Bridge of the Gods, which vantage points furnishes distant views eastward and westerly of the beautiful Columbia Gorge. Thence proceeding easterly along the Gorge to Maryhill museum and view point, from the westerly evergreen vegetation to the prairie and open range country east of Cascade. Then a climb over to Goldendale Washington and a circle back past the snow capped mountains by way of Klickitat on fine gravelled roads and following the beautiful Klickitat River down to the Evergreen Highway. Thence through Bingen and return by way of the Evergreen Highway to Vancouver along a scenic highway keeping Mt. Hood in view the greater portion of the trip and stopping at view points to see the Oregon shore from a distance. The writer has never been able to decide which view of the gorge he liked the most. Guess it is a toss-up. Then to Vancouver and return to Portland by way of the Interstate Bridge.

Truly a most satisfactory outing—a trip to remember.
