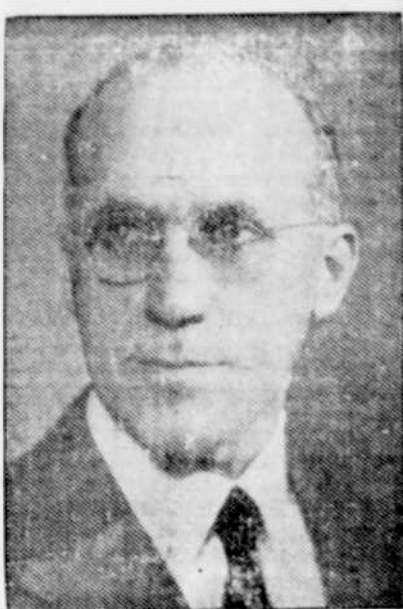

Milk prices in Washington county are scheduled to advance one cent a quart according to an agreement following an organization meeting of milk producers and distributors at Hillsboro Tuesday night.

C. C. Gault of Tigard, was elected president of the organization to be known as Washington County Market Milk Assn.; other officers chosen were Francis Barr, Hillsboro, vice president, Mrs. William Guyton, Forest Grove, secretary. C. C. Noblitt, Laurewood, and Fred Sheller, Aloha, were named to the executive committee.

Cream prices were advanced two cents except quarts which were raised five cents; the half pint coffee cream was retained at the old price of fifteen cents to conform to Portland prices. The price raise will be submitted to the Oregon milk control board.

Roy Davidson Gives Interesting Resume of Beaverton 35 Years Ago

"Five gallons of gas and a quart of oil—yes sir!" said A. B. Clement as he reached for the hose of his gas pump. After the customer had roared away, Mr. Clement came back to the subject—the Beaverton of 1906-8. For the ensuing half hour, between gallons of gas, quarts of oil and an ailing battery or two, he went back along memory's way and dug up some of the old happenings that were common better than a third of a century ago. You see A. B. Clement arrived in Beaverton early in 1905, just in time to take in the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

So we're back 35 years now and you're approaching the town from Portland. And what's more, you're riding in a wagon along the dirt road—careful! there's a bad chuck-hole just ahead. They're not going to pave this stretch and call it

Canyon Road for a long, long time. You see, we're pretty far-sighted here in 1906; we can call the turn on a lot of things. We'll take things as we get into town. Here, on our right is the grade school, two or three rooms and just across the road from where they'll build the McCready Lumber yard.

Clement doesn't have his filling station there yet on account of the fact that they'll still be using horses and wagons for several years yet. But over at the Mission Bell Station corner is the blacksmith shop, operated by William Squires, father of Lester Squires, who'll run the Mission Bell. Will is always glad to hear a wagon rumbling along towards his shop—that's the way he made his living, nailing shoes onto horses and repairing wagons. Of course he takes on other jobs, any blacksmith job, and he's a good workman, too.

In case you need to consult the doctor or buy some liniment, stop at Dr. Robinson's (no relation to Harry Robinson's people) drug store. The doctor will find out what's wrong, if you're ailing, then he'll write you a prescription and step to the back room to fill it. On down the street where the Plymouth Garage will be, when everybody will have to have a car, is the shop of Vincent Mazzie. Vince is not only the town's shoe repairman, but photographer as well. He'll fix the heels on your brogans, then take your picture.

August Rossi has a saloon on the site of the future Richey Hardware. C. E. Hedge's store is across the street—it will be the Safeway store later. And the Chevrolet Garage will mark the spot where the Morris Butcher shop stands. And across to the left is the alley that runs south to the S. P. depot. Here on Sunday afternoon's, you'll find most of the town-folks gather there about five o'clock to see the Portland train come through, and to bid their city guests goodbye as they board the coaches for home. There are two trains each way daily. Morning and night—they run from the Union Station out Barbur boulevard through Bertha, the Mott farm and to Beaverton. Thence on to Sheridan and Corvallis. A 3 car special has been running—Forest Grove to Portland since August to care for the fair goers. Just north of the future grade school are the turn tables where the extra locomotives, used to double head the heavy trains up the hill from Portland, are turned around. They go back empty.

And just west of the depot is the old incubator, sometimes called the Hamilton building. Here on the ground floor are the postoffice and Fisk barber shop. The council meets upstairs. It's odd, this old building. It is somewhat shapeless, yet it has all kinds of shapes and different roof levels, for they built it first and then added on all kinds of alcoves and additions. Here on council nights—well, let's look back now from our enlightened position of 1941.

That 1906 council was composed of blacksmith Will Squires, August Rossi, town saloonman, Bob Hocken and George Hughton. Over at the recorder's table was A. B. Clement, Earl Fisher was the mayor and A. H. Spraner was town treasurer. William Hunter was marshal. There were no paved streets, no highways to contend with and so the council was not concerned with any whizzy traffic problems. But that doesn't mean there was no traffic. Here's a digest of ordinance No. 4, passed in May, 1906:

"No horses, cows, mules, sheep or goats will be allowed to roam in the streets or alleys or public places, provided, however, that milk cows not brachy or vicious, may run at large during daylight hours. Vice."
