Bus Dedication
Wednesday NiteCeremony Scheduled at
High School Athletic Field

Dedication of the City of Beaverton, a new streamlined blue and white clipper bus, being added to the already fine fleet of Oregon Motor Stage busses, will be an event of Wednesday evening, August 6th, at the Beaverton high school athletic field at 7 p. m.

The Kiwanis club, sponsors of the affair, have made extensive arrangements for a gala evening. Prominent personages, including officials of the motor company, will be on hand to take part in the ceremonies. Public inspection of the City of Beaverton is invited following the ceremonies.

These Blue and White Streamlined Clipper Busses are luxurious affairs seating twenty-nine passengers in reclining, deeply cushioned seats. The motors are mounted in the rear. Air brakes for safety and air conditioning for comfort are part of their equipment. Each of the ten busses put into service recently, are named after some town enroute, for instance, there is the City of Hillsboro, City of Forest Grove, City of Cannon Beach, City of Seaside, City of Astoria, City of Tillamook, Neah-A-Kahnie, City of Warrenton, our own City of Beaverton, and the City of McMinnville to be dedicated during August.

Service of these busses over the Wolf Creek highway puts Tualatin Valley residents less than three hours ride from Cannon Beach, Seaside and Gearhart. Running time also greatly reduced to Astoria, Manzanita, Nehalem, Wheeler, Brigh-ton, Manhattan, Rockaway, Garibaldi and Tillamook, seven round trips daily via Wolf Creek highway. Three round trips daily via McMinnville and Valley Junction.

About September 20th added service will be routed over the new Wilson River highway.

Another addition to Oregon Motor Stages service is the establishment of a midnight schedule from Portland at 12:15 a. m. going through to Astoria.

A great deal of credit is due the Oregon Motor Stages for the excellent service and frequent schedules maintained in the Tualatin Valley. From early morning to late at night they provide frequent, safe, and economical transportation. Their type of transportation service has done much to attract residents to the community and so contribute definitely to the tremendous growth in population the past few years.

Washington County Still
Free of Indebtedness

Washington county is enjoying a continued freedom from any bonds or outstanding endorsed warrants with noteworthy gains having been made in tax collections, evidenced by the semi-annual officer's report.

Tax collections to June 30, reported by Sheriff J. W. Connell amounted to \$776,239.33 of which \$627,192.74 was applied against current rolls; for the same period last year collections amounted to \$788,467.18 of which \$622,266.32 were for the current levies. Receipts this year were represented in a drop of \$30,000 from the 1940 total tax bill of \$1,000,223.34 to be collected.

The county collected \$807,622.66 from all sources during the six months. The cash balance as of June 30 was \$250,630.70 nearly \$34,000 less than for the same period last year. Warrants not yet paid are \$4290.24 and these have been called but not cashed. Only interest paid in the past six months was \$2.68 on warrants.

Dr. Talbert will act as master of ceremonies and Mayor Rossi will make the speech of acceptance. The bus will be christened by some lovely young lady, who will earn the title of Queen by selling tags for the library. Each tag will be worth ten votes and cost 10c. The proceeds from the votes will go to the library. New Aluminum Plant for
Multnomah County

The production of aluminum for airplane construction has come to be one of the major bottlenecks in national defense. As I have heretofore reported, the Office of Production Management has now provided for seven new plants for the production of aluminum, one of which I have been urging be erected in Multnomah County. It now seems definitely assured that this plant will be located at Troutdale.

Military and Naval Academy
Vacancies to be Filled

I have received notice from the War and Navy Departments that I will have an appointment of principal and alternates to each Academy, for entrance next year. I will ask the Civil Service Commission to conduct a competitive examination on Saturday, October 4, 1941, to determine such appointees. All candidates must be actual residents of Multnomah County and must meet the physical requirements prescribed by each Academy. Candidates for the Military Academy must be between the ages of 17 and 22 on July 1, 1942, and candidates for the Naval Academy must be not less than 17 years of age nor more than 21 years of age on April 1, 1942.

The competitive civil service examination will be held in the following subjects, for both academies: Algebra, plane geometry, English composition and literature, and United States history; in addition, applicants for the Military Academy will be examined in ancient history and English grammar.

Anyone eligible for designation who wishes to take these examinations should write to me at once, 1631 House Office Building, Washington, D. C., advising whether he wishes to take an examination or both. He should give his full name, date of birth, parents' name and address and whether he wishes to be examined in Portland or at some other point more convenient to him.

Aluminum To Be
Collected Monday

Preparations for the pick up of aluminum in the collection centers of Washington county is under way this week, under the direction of L. L. McIntyre, county engineer, who has been placed in charge of this operation.

Collection will begin Monday, August 4, at Sherwood, and will require three days. The aluminum from outlying districts will be concentrated in Hillsboro, weighed and prepared for shipment.

The following is a schedule for the pick up and those persons in charge in the various centers should have all aluminum ready at the time specified. For eastern Washington county time is as follows: Monday, Sherwood, 9 a. m.; Tualatin 9:45; Tigard 10:15; Beaverton 11 a. m.; Cedar Mills 1 p. m.

Wednesday: Scholls 1 p. m.; Kinton 1:30 p. m.; Aloha 2:15 p. m.; Reedville 2:45 p. m.; Orenco 3:15 p. m.; Helvetia 3:30 p. m.

Wherever small quantities of aluminum have been accumulated considerable time could be saved in the pick up if the aluminum was placed in sacks.

Rural Mail Carriers Agents
In Sale of Defense Stamps

Thirty-two thousand rural mail carriers are now acting as agents in the sale of Defense Savings Stamps, postal officials have informed the Treasury Department. Demand for the stamps in sparsely settled districts caused the Post Office Department to authorize the carriers to act as salesmen.

The stamps range in value from ten cents to five dollars. Purchasers are given albums in which they can be mounted. When filled, the albums may be exchanged for defense Savings Bonds.

Post Office officials recalled that rural mail carriers acted in similar capacities in 1917 and 1918 selling War Savings Stamps.

County School Fund
Shows Cash Increase

The annual report of Washington county schools to state superintendent of instruction Monday revealed a cash balance of \$63,329.56 or an increase over last year of \$3882.73 according to B. W. Barnes, county school superintendent.

Receipts during the year totaled \$717,199.62, expenditures against this item were \$653,870.06. Bonded and warrant indebtedness show a marked decrease with expenditures in the districts over last year by \$51,735.80.

Salaries paid for the year 1941 were \$327,282.42 or an increase of \$5290.41 over the 1940 figure of \$321,992.01. There are 104 elementary schools and eight high schools in the county.

Jail Check-up Brings
"Clean Bill" Rating

Semi-annual check up of Washington county jail Friday brought a clean bill to sheriff J. W. Connell and commendations to county officials for its facilities and its maintenance, according to Bernard Anderson, federal prison inspector.

The arrangement whereby Fred Ennis, jailer and his wife, as cook, live at the jail brought an expression of approval and they were commended for their work. The jail was classed as one of the best in the state.

The only criticism was the practice of allowing prisoners to conduct the traditional kangaroo court whereby small fines are assessed incoming prisoners to maintain a fund for purchase of tobacco and other articles.

Truth About
Living CostsBabson Says Now 10%
Below 1929

Babson Park, Mass., August 1—We hear much talk about the increased cost of living. Thus far this is largely propaganda issued by labor leaders and men in Washington anxious to get more authority and create more government jobs. As Al Smith used to say: "Let's look at the record." Here are the official figures. The U. S. Index is based on the 1913-1919 average as equal to 100.

This table shows that although there has been an increase in Canadian prices of about 10% since the War began, there has been an increase in U. S. prices of only about 5%. This increase has been almost wholly in foodstuffs and that largely in cities. Agricultural communities, in which 60% of our people live, have seen no average increase. In fact, the only portions really suffering are the Defense Areas and their increases have been more than offset by wage increases.

A study of the Canadian figures also shows that in Canada there has been a decided slowing down in the rate of increase. It is very probable that the rise in U. S. prices will, likewise, slow down after the present excitement is over and farm prices reach parity.

What About Rent?
The cost of building has gone up 9% over a year ago; but 70% of this increase went to labor and taxes, not instead of several hours with your plodding oxen of yore, a modern car will get you the eight miles from the Old Castle down to Oregon City in just a few minutes.

The highway that now swings easterly from Tualatin towards Oregon City flows in sweeping folds through a farming country, interspersed with isles of fir timber. But it wasn't always thus. Back in the early days, that road was the main thoroughfare from the Tualatin country as far westward as Tualatin Plains, now Forest Grove, to the settlements at the falls of the Willamette. In those days the road was a crude affair, fairly passable in summer, a mud blockade in winter, and over it passed the ox carts and wagons of Tualatin Valley pioneers on their way to and from Oregon City where they went to trade and sell their produce.

The timber was one great set then; the farms with small cleared fields were the isles. The road was a crooked affair that had to fight against the creeping brush and wilderness and it remained the same year after year. It was the same old road in 1878, rutted and worn by innumerable hoofs and wheels of nearly forty years travel. That was the year that George Saum's father came westward from Scranton, Pennsylvania, and settled on what is now the old Castle Ranch. That's where George lives today—right there in the Old Castle on the old Oregon City road. Though old timer's would throw up their hands and gasp if they saw the transformation, for back in the early 1920's the road was graded and gravelled. Now it's blacktop and sports a yellow line.
