Nut Growers Announce Summer Tour Aug. 13-14

Washington and Marion counties will be the location for this year's summer tour of the Western Nut Growers association, August 13 and 14, according to L. R. Pearson, Reedville, president, and O. T. McWhorter of the O. S. C. extension service acting secretary.

The first day of the tour will be devoted largely to filbert growing. The party will meet at the L. R. Pearson filbert farm one-half mile northeast of Reedville at 9 o'clock Wednesday, August 13. A 25-acre orchard of five-year-old trees will be observed there with special attention to soil conditions and pruning practices. Other visits that forenoon will be made to the Myers and Thornburgh farms, and in the afternoon to the Thornburg and Woodford plantings near Forest Grove.

The second day of the tour will be devoted to walnut orchards in Marion county, the exact itinerary to be announced later.

Among specialists who will be on the tour to help answer questions will be C. E. Schuster, federal horticulturist; Paul Miller, federal plant pathologist; B. G. Thompson, entomologist of the experiment station, and county agents in the counties visited.

Farm Help Shortage Brings Request to Defer Agricultural Students

Because of the growing shortage of farm workers and farm produce, L. Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, State Director of Selective Service for Oregon, today emphasized that local boards have ample authority to defer students of agriculture as men "in training or preparation for" necessary occupations.

Existing Selective Service Regulations covering "necessary men" are sufficiently broad to permit deferment of agricultural students, the Director declared.

"Some misunderstanding," he said, "has arisen on the question of whether or not the local board has the power to defer students of agriculture. I am in receipt of a communication from national headquarters which dispels all doubt in this matter."

This communication, Colonel Wooton says, states: "National Headquarters has issued a number of memoranda with respect to deferment of necessary men in preparation or training for essential occupations."

"Considerable inquiry has developed as to the authority of local boards to defer students of agriculture. It is believed that the memoranda set forth clearly indicate that local boards have ample authority to defer such students of agriculture as are found by the local boards to be necessary men within the meaning of the Selective Service Regulations."

The Regulations provide, Colonel Wooton asserted, for deferment of "... any registrant found to be a necessary man" in any industry, business, employment, agricultural pursuit, government service, or any other service or endeavor or in training or preparation therefor.

"Obviously, this should apply to agricultural students," Colonel Wooton said. He also emphasized that a growing shortage of farm workers and the growing need for farm produce calls for special consideration of all individual claims of men now engaged in agricultural pursuits.

Such consideration must be given, he continued, in view of a recent statement by the Secretary of Agriculture, Claude R. Wickard, which pointed out that the problem of agricultural production already is very serious in some areas.
