

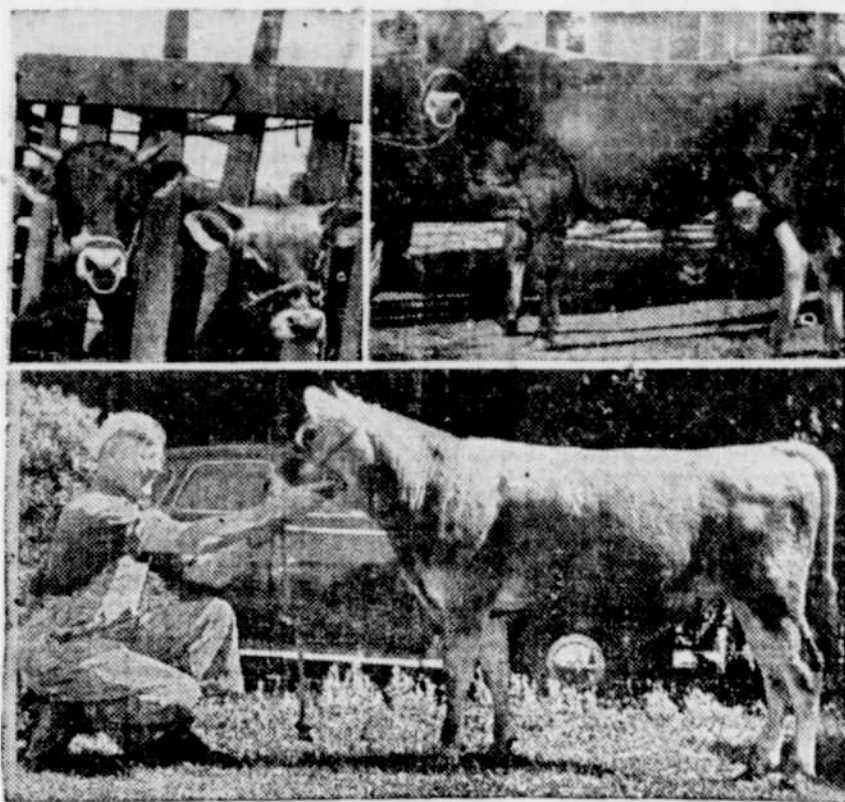

Oregon Breeders Furnish Jerseys

J. H. Gipson, president of Claxton Printers, Cladwell, Idaho, recently selected 21 registered and 7 grade Jersey heifers and 1 young bull from Oregon breeders to better utilize the abundance of alfalfa hay that he produces on his two Payette County Idaho farms at New Plymouth. D. E. Warren, Payette County Agent, assisted in the selection. Included also was a bull calf from Neil Mathews of New Plymouth from the George Horning herd at Sherwood, Oregon. The calf is sired by Andy Noble Tolo and out of a 492 pound Silver Medal 2-year old dam.

Upper left, in the cut attached, shows the Gipson bull and another young bull purchased by Lloyd Johnson of New Plymouth for use in the bull-stud which he operates. Both bulls represent phenomenally high production and commendable type. The Johnson bull, upper right, was bred by David Hagg and Sons at Reedville, Oregon. The Gipson bull is shown held by its breeder, D. R. Dickie of Newberg, Oregon.

The Hagg bull will serve with bulls previously purchased from John Koplin of Gaston, Oregon, and C. C. Smith of Yakima, Washington. He is a son of Dorothy's Remus, whose sire is the highest living sire of the breed. Sixteen daughters of Dorothy's Remus in the Hagg herd are all on production test and those that have completed records, produced from 400 to 495 pounds of butterfat as 2-year olds. The dam of the bull is the daughter of Madrid's Tristram St. Mawes, whose 56 tested daughters averaged 478 pounds of fat. The mother of the young bull has produced over 500 pounds of fat in one year and has produced an average of 464 pounds of fat per year for seven consecutive years on twice a day milking, and has calved each year.

Aid for Extension of Road Project Assured

Senator McNary has received assurance from WPA that arrangements are about completed for construction of the Bonny Slope extension of the Wolf Creek highway district project.

The area involved is a square mile of Bonny Slope, which had been annexed by Cedar Mill district, in a water district. Bonds were issued and expense involved and the sponsors were afraid the WPA might withdraw in the general cutting of WPA projects. The project involves laying about five miles of water mains along the road extension.

Oregon's Aluminum To Build 15 Planes

Scrap aluminum collected in Oregon was sufficient to build fifteen pursuit planes, Jerold Owen, state civilian defense co-ordinator, said this week.

A total of 110,046 pounds have been delivered to concentration centers in Portland. Four carloads already have been shipped to the federated metals division of the American Smelting & Refining company plant at San Francisco, and 11,062 pounds remain on hand in the Portland warehouse.

Eighty-two percent of the metal donated by housewives will actually be used in defense manufacture of tanks, shell fuses, portable equipment, instruments, soldier's equipment, and some in planes, although most of it will not have the tensile strength when reclaimed for this purpose, Owen said.

Every 5000 dishpans, 10,000 coffee percolators, 2000 roasters or 2500 boilers will permit the building of one fighting plane.

Timberline Lodge Popular Place

In July 9470 automobiles, including 2441 from out of the state, were driven to Timberline lodge, according to Albert Wiesendanger, forest ranger for the Mount Hood national forest. Wiesendanger reports that more than 38,114 visitors were at Timberline lodge and that 5251 visitors rode the chair lift to Silver hut. Many visitors are parking their cars along Timberline lodge road and gathering huckleberries, which are now at their best.

The Crop and Farm Situation

Babson Park, Mass., August 22—The steady gain being made in the production of essential foods will do as much to ultimately win World War II for the Democracies as will the building of mechanized and other implements of defense. At the proper time the agricultural surpluses of the United States and Canada which for months past have been under transfer to strategically located seaboard points will be of prime value in negotiating with the German people (not necessarily with Hitler's gang) the kind of peace the Allies want. The day may come when the man or woman of Berlin will consume as much American and Canadian wheat as will the people of Detroit, London or Montreal.

Grain Holdings
The United States Government owns approximately 370,000,000 bushels of wheat, corn and rye. In addition they hold as collateral under seal for loans to producers another 340,000,000 bushels of corn, wheat, barley and rye. All this was either acquired by the Government or sealed under Federal loans at prices under current market quotations. Allowing for deductions covering storage, carrying and handling charges, the U. S. Government and co-operating farmers have a paper profit from their operations since 1938 which is estimated at approximately \$50,000,000.

The weekly visible supply of wheat is showing huge increases in the U. S. and Canada. Both countries will have large harvests from spring sowings. The U. S. total crop will be the fifth largest on record. Storage facilities are becoming acute as these harvests gain momentum. In one mid-west terminal alone 85% of the arriving wheat is for storage rather than for sale. Freight cars are piling up to the detriment of defense shipping. In spite of our big crop and large carry-over the price of wheat continues to rise. I anticipate that there is little likelihood of a price ceiling for wheat or for other farm products, at least in the near future.

Prosperity for Farmers
The Department of Agriculture officially reports a continually rising level of prices for farm products. From the middle of March to the middle of July prices rose 22 points. Certainly, still higher prices can be expected for the grains. This is why wheat farmers are at present storing so much grain rather than selling it. Ultimately they feel the Government will take it over anyway, so why sell now for less than they can get by borrowing on their current crop at present Government loan rates? Hog prices also should continue to average well above a year ago and the price of cattle may likewise be maintained at a relatively high level. Consumer demand for these products as well as for lambs, chickens, and dairy products should mean higher prices all around for the long term.

While no reliable news is available in all probability not a great deal of wheat in the Russian Ukranian has been lost either thru destruction by the Russians in their retreat or by the German advance. For one thing the crop was too green to burn. Hence, the bulk of this will probably be available for Central Europe. It will be far from sufficient, however, and with the continuance of the British blockade food conditions in Europe will be terrible. Our own exports of all farm products to Great Britain, particularly of dairy products, will be cut.

Beaverton High School Band Called to Practice

All members of the Beaverton high school band are requested to meet at the high school September 3 and 4 for practice.

The Beaverton high school band will again march for its seventh year at the Oregon State Fair. The Journal Juniors will also march.

There are now 40 in the school band and they attract attention with their smart uniforms of orange and gold, with majorettes in white and gold.

George Thyng Named Beaverton Justice

Salem, Aug. 22—Governor Charles A. Sprague today appointed George Thyng to become justice of the peace at Beaverton, succeeding H. J. Valentine, resigned. Thyng held the same job during the administration of former Governor Julius Meier.

Plan That Labor Day Motor Trip to Include Columbia Highway Drive

With the approaching Labor Day holiday residents of the Tualatin Valley are mulling over possibilities of a motor trip the entire family will enjoy.

One trip stands out over all others in diversified interest—and that is a drive over the beautiful Columbia Highway—crossing the Gorge at the Bridge of the Gods—return by way of the Evergreen Highway.

The trip starts out Base Line Road, follows along the high banks of the Sandy to the river crossing joining the Columbia highway. One may then drive leisurely over this beautiful road with casual stops at various falls and scenic points. A stop at Bonneville dam to view the beautiful grounds and the mad rush of water going over the spillway at the top of the dam in torrents. Then a stop at Bonneville Fish hatchery to inspect the trout and bring back happy memories of fly fishing in white water.

Driving on along the new wide highways to Cascade Locks and crossing over the 135 foot high Bridge of the Gods, which vantage points furnishes distant views easterly and westerly of the beautiful Columbia Gorge. Probably the most interesting feature to many is inspection of the novel fish ladders and elevators from the north bank at Bonneville which provides passage of salmon over the dam.

Returning by way of the Evergreen Highway in Washington to Vancouver affords many beautiful vistas from points of vantage along this highway.

Hundreds of picnicking spots are found all along the way—truly a most satisfactory outing for the whole family—a trip to remember. The leaves of your album this winter and make the trip in your mind's eye again and again, so be sure to take a camera along on that Labor Day trip up the Columbia and over the Bridge of the Gods.

Packing Mail In Early Days

Well fellows, did you ever pocket and promise to mail the letter your wife handed you, and then some day, weeks later, dig the bedraggled and crumpled thing, nearly worn out from the bottom of your pants pocket? Chances are you never bothered to tell your wife of the oversight. Somehow or other it hardly seemed the thing to do.

Wives of the Tualatin Valley country, 100 years ago, back in the eighteenth forties, fully expected to have their letters packed and mailed around, not weeks but months, and they were mighty glad of the privilege. And some of those letters never got mailed at all, for there were plenty of wild Indians and other hazards lurking between the letter writer and the postoffice. Incidentally, Weston, Missouri, just 2000 miles away was the nearest post-office.

The letters to mail were given to whoever happened to be going eastward across the mountains and plains, and who would bother to take mail along. And after the weary traveler reached the frontier office in Weston, he could buy no stamps to put in the letters. The folks in Oregon had none. There were none for sale anywhere—they didn't start making postage stamps until 1850. The letters went COD from Weston, the person at the receiving end had to dig up for postage.

That early Oregon group of pioneers had a way of getting things done, however, and after they got the first Provisional government organized and working in '43, they began to think of better mail service. About the only time anyone got a letter was when someone arrived from the east, bringing mail and word from back there. In '45 the Provisional government memorialized Congress for Postal Service between Oregon and Independence, Missouri.

Well, you know how Congress always was about early day Oregon—they wondered if the whole thing was worth bothering over. Finally, they did appropriate \$100,000 for a mail each way from the east to Oregon once every two months by way of the Isthmus. Astoria was to be the Oregon terminus, and from there the mail would be distributed through-

Announce Vacancy In Naval Academies

The First Congressional District of Oregon will have two vacancies in 1942 at both the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, and at the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, New York.

To determine the eligible candidates residing in the First Oregon District, Congressman Mott has requested the Civil Service Commission to hold a preliminary qualifying examination on Saturday, October 4, 1941.

Candidates for admission to the Naval Academy must be no less than seventeen years of age nor more than twenty-one years of age on April 1, 1942. Candidates for the Military Academy are eligible for admission from the day they are seventeen until they become twenty-two years of age, on which latter day they are not eligible. Candidates for both Academies must never have been married.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that applicants notify Congressman James W. Mott, Salem, Oregon, not later than September 15, 1941 of their desire to participate in the examination.
