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Babson Says
More Taxes
Not Needed

Gloucester, Mass., August 29—The chief discussion in Washington and Ottawa today is over taxes. Even "price control" is secondary as one purpose of taxation is to keep people from rushing to buy goods. Some change from a few years ago when governments were urging us all to buy more! Guess if the politicians let us alone at all times to learn by experience the nation would be better off in the end.

Increased Taxes Unnecessary
My purpose this week—however—is not to discuss the pros and cons of proposed tax bills, but to show readers how much they are already paying in taxes. I must, however, say that the proposed "joint husband and wife tax return" is vicious, un-moral and unfair. If \$300,000,000 more is needed it should be raised by higher excise taxes on things responsible for crime. Crime alone is costing the U. S. and Canada \$18,000,000,000 a year.

A serious offense is committed in the United States every 21 seconds or a total of 1,517,026 major crimes. This averages one for every 87 persons, including a felonious homicide every 44 minutes, a robbery every 15 minutes, an auto theft every 3 minutes, a burglary every 2.3 minutes and a larceny every 35 seconds. Fifty per cent of the criminals are under 25 years of age. Let us also remember that the fire losses alone last year would have purchased 41 great cruisers for the U. S. Navy and 5 for Canada. In other words, if we all would get busy to eliminate crime, our taxes need really not cost us anything.

Taxes Which Everyone Now Pays
Already NOW 35% of what we pay in rent goes to taxes. When buying a loaf of bread NOW, 20% goes for direct taxes and 25% for indirect or a total of 45%. From every \$100 we NOW pay for clothes, the tax collectors take 52 different kinds of taxes. U. S. taxes averaged last year \$109 for every man, woman and child. According to the Committee of Americans, 122 East 42 St., New York City.

Every time we pay an electric light bill we are giving \$1 out of every \$4 of it toward taxes. . . . An average of \$13 is paid yearly in taxes by every telephone user. . . . The house wife pays \$1 in taxes out of every \$4 she spends. . . . There are over 140 different taxes figured in the cost of a pair of shoes—even for the baby. . . . The cost of the average car is paid out all over again every four years by taxes the motorist pays in operating it. . . . In drugs—a bottle of milk of magnesia carries 378 different taxes. . . . Railroads' taxes have more than doubled since 1916—now about 1-3 of our fare is taxes and so on.

Taxes on Dividends and Wages
The American Federation of Investors of Chicago shows that the corporation owned by 7,118,000 stockholders paid an average tax of \$3.00 per common share, or almost double the amount paid in dividends. If these companies could have paid taxes only on their property, either these 7,118,000 stockholders could have received \$329 more in dividends or else each employee could have received \$600 more per year in salary. With lower taxes you would get more interest on savings accounts and lower life insurance costs.

I am not now asking that taxes be reduced, but I do say it is unfair to increase them. . . . It would be far better to eliminate all "tax-exempts." Existing state and local U. S. government securities total \$20,000,000,000 with over a billion new ones being issued each year. It seems unfair not to tax all securities alike if these were taxed—at least the new ones issued—this would be another solution to our problem.

Putting More People to Work
We cannot have prosperity by putting a ball and chain on employers. No sensible farmer puts a check rein on a horse hauling a heavy load. "We cannot lift wage workers up by pulling wage payers down." There is today a scarcity of skilled workers; but at least 6,000,000 people are still looking for jobs. Let us, therefore, encourage more men to become employers by making it easier—instead of harder—for them.

The elimination of tax-exempts should help employment. Rich people would then quit burying their money in tax-exempt bonds. They would put their money to work building more factories, stores and other enterprises which give employment. There is enough money in the U. S. and Canada to give everyone of good character a good living. One difficulty is that this money is in "tax-raiders' hands" afraid to go to work. Let's

Mayor Rossi
Urges Civilians
To Register Now

The campaign for volunteer civic reserves in Beaverton got underway Monday at the City hall, according to Mayor Rossi.

The percentage of chance that this country will be subjected to air raid bombing is small, but it is of vital importance to every person in the nation that we be adequately prepared. In Poland, Holland, and Belgium where they were unprepared for bombings because they were told "it couldn't happen" the loss of life was heavy, entire cities were wiped out and others partially destroyed. After London had perfected her Civilian Defense methods, the loss of life declined sharply, although at first through insufficient training and lack of coordination the loss of life was tremendous. We can take our cue from London and benefit from the experience of the people of England. Happenings in Europe have proved that a properly trained Civilian Defense Force is as necessary to the life and property of a country as the Armed Forces.

During an air raid it is necessary for the civilian populace to keep destruction of life and industrial activity at a minimum. Fires must be extinguished; throughfares kept open; communication must be maintained; bombs located and put out; people guided to shelters; injured people given first aid or removed to hospitals; gas and water mains repaired, and debris cleared from streets. Only a trained Civilian Defense Force could do all these things. Both men and women volunteers should be over 17 years of age. Men may enlist as police reserves, fire reserves, aircraft observers, air raid wardens, first aid, etc. Women may enlist in first aid, motor corps, aircraft warning, assistant fire warden, accident prevention, home economics, etc.

Mayor Rossi urges everyone who possibly can to enlist as soon as possible, so that classes can be formed and training started at once. Enlist at the Beaverton city hall.
