ing to see who can get the most for their members—without any regard for the nation's welfare. Unfortunately, the more radical group—the CIO—has the sounder program; while the more conservative group—the AFofL—has out-of-date setup. The CIO organizes one industry independently of what the workers do. For instance, under the CIO, the Detroit electricians who work in the auto industry are in the same union with the auto machinists, auto painters etc. But under the AFofL, all of the Detroit electricians are in the Electrical Workers Union, while all of the Detroit painters are in the Painters Union—irrespective of whether they work on autos or houses.

Government Interference
 Another unfortunate situation is the anti-employer attitude assumed by Madam Perkins. Having served the nation as Director General of Information of the Labor Administration during World War I, I know the great importance of an impartial

Secretary of Labor at a time like this. The wage workers of 1914-18 were a large factor in winning World War I because of the wise leadership of Secretary of Labor Wilson. If, however, Hitler is victorious in World War II, I am afraid history will blame it onto our Labor Department and the United States Labor Relations Board. This is no time to throw monkey wrenches into industry by playing politics. For further particulars, I refer readers to the experiences of the Ford Motor Company.

Labor vs. Investors
 Labor leaders seem to forget that the value of their insurance policies, savings bank accounts, and even old-age pensions depends 100% upon the corporations (for which they are working) making profits. Working conditions have been bad in certain localities and I honor those labor leaders who have rectified them; but these labor leaders should know when to stop.

Already I note a tendency on the part of careful investors to sell out their holdings in industries where labor leaders have recently secured control. They know what has happened to dividends under such conditions. It will probably take years for the motor industry to again earn what it did previous to 1931. Neither wage workers nor stockholders will get as much in "food, clothing, and shelter" as before it was CIO unionized.

America's Opportunity
 America is today at the parting of the ways. One road is paved with dissension, waste, and political pressure blocs seeking their own selfish interests, forgetting the nation's good. The other road is paved with co-operation, conservation, and truly representative government. I have faith to believe that employers, wage workers, and Congressmen are going to be wise enough to choose the latter road.

And these sane principles apply to the international situation. The small independent European nations must forget their old traditions. They must combine. The peoples of these nations must quit wasting either human or material resources for exploitation or profit. Both collective bargaining and representative government are sound; but "mob rule," whether in labor unions or the halls of Congress, must stop in order to save democracy.

Right or Left?
 We hear too much about personal liberties and the "right" to strike rather than to arbitrate; but arbitration is right. Both employers and labor leaders give too much thought for themselves and too little to the 130,000,000 consumers in this country. Only as more is produced, is there more to divide. Wage workers need more employers and hence should encourage them.

Why do we need to look either to the Right or to the Left? Why need we be either pro-labor or anti-labor? Why can't we look straight ahead? Let us follow the English system of negotiating as an entire industry, with ALL the employers and employees of that industry being represented. It is wrong for labor leaders to sandbag only those corporations which have had efficient management.

Two Facts to Remember
 1. A pendulum must swing as long as the clock runs. This applies to labor's attitude, wages and hours, as it applies to profits, commodities, and politics. Today, labor is in the saddle and holds the whip; but labor leaders will soon overreach and the public will then react against them as it has reacted against Wall Street. Then the employers—yes, and Wall Street—will again get in the saddle and hold the whip until they again abuse their trust. And so it will go!
 2. There is but one solution. This will come only as all of us get more true religion. No one group in industry or politics will indefinitely take orders from some other group; but all groups should be willing to "take orders" from God. The same principle applies to nations. Peace will never come by any one race ruling the world. Peace will come only as all nations gradually acknowledge God as their leader, savior, and friend.
