In accordance with the provisions of the "Local Budget Law", (Sections 110-1201 to 110-1215 O. C. L. A. as amended) notice is hereby given that the Budget Committee of the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, has prepared in compliance with the "Local Budget Law", Budget Estimates for the ensuing fiscal period January 1, 1942, to June 30, 1942. All persons are hereby notified that on Monday, the 27th day of October 1941, at 8:00 P. M., in the City Hall, First and Main Streets, Beaverton, Oregon, the following Budget Estimates for the ensuing fiscal period ending June 30, 1942, for the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, may be discussed with the City Council, the levying board for said Town of Beaverton, Oregon, and any person subject to the proposed tax levy or tax levies will be heard in favor of or against said proposed tax levy or tax levies or any part thereof.

The estimates of expenditures to be required, the miscellaneous revenues to be received and the taxes on property to be levied as prepared by the Budget Committee, and adopted September 24, 1941, are set forth in the following statement.
