in companies which are seeing their employees ruthlessly "organized" by the CIO come to me in great distress. They also insist that it is not primarily a question of wage raises, but rather of discipline and efficiency. They claim that under a closed shop the labor leaders really rule and the efficiency greatly declines.

I tell these investors to quit their worry, give up struggling against the inevitable and gradually shift their holdings into something which will profit by this labor union move. For instance, when wages are advancing and working hours reduced, wage workers families spend much more in the local stores. Hence, I advise selling the stock in the XYZ Manufacturing Company and buying the stock in the leading grocery store corporation which is feeding the neighborhood of the XYZ Manufacturing Company. Also some shares in the leading department stores of that community may be a purchase. Investors who have taken such advice have come out satisfactorily.

**Studying Book Values**  
Cannot the same principle be used in connection with Mr. Morgenthau's threat of allowing only 6% on book values? For instance, I understand that the book value of Standard Oil of Ohio is around \$65 a share, while this stock is selling at only about 40. If the Government should allow 6% on this \$65 before any radical excess profit taxes, then certainly the investor has nothing to fear from a 6% ceiling. Other reported illustrations are American Woolen Preferred with a book value of over \$100 selling at about 74, and Mack Truck with a book value of over \$60 selling at around 30. I am not recommending these stocks, but I do insist that if you hold these and certain other stocks, Mr. Morgenthau should not worry you.

I prefer not to give illustrations of those stocks whose book value is less than current prices, but will give you this tip: Among such will be found the stocks of certain automobile, tobacco, airplane, soft drink and patent medicine companies. Companies that have spent large sums in building up trademarks very often suffer by having a low book value. This is not necessarily a criticism of these companies.

**Conclusion**  
This column appears in nearly 400 papers with a circulation of several million readers. Yet, I receive very few complaints about what I say, but I am burdened with complaints about the Government, about taxes, about Wall Street, about big business and small business. The American people have a complex on complaints. Too many are fearful for security, income, jobs, politics, war, etc. Yet the fun of life is in the striving; not in the arriving. Therefore, the message this week is not concerning Mr. Morgenthau's 6% tirade—but rather I am using this as an illustration of the message "let us overcome our obstacles instead of fretting about them."

P. S. One good piece of news comes to my desk as I am dictating this column. There will be lots of turkeys for the holidays. Over 35,000,000 birds have been raised this year, beating the world's record, with an average weight of one-half pound more than a year ago. Therefore, we can all have a happy Thanksgiving.

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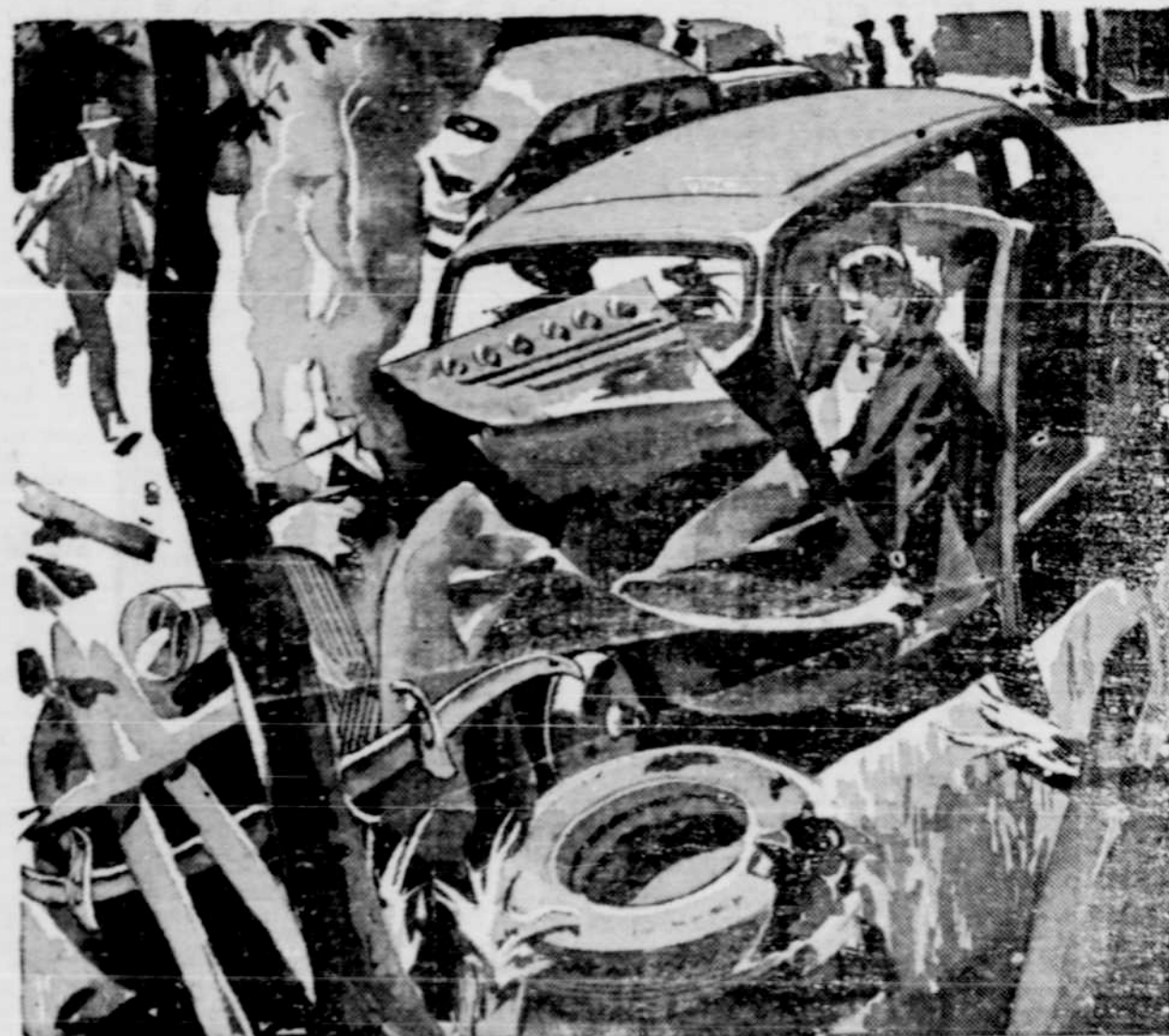
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Most accidents could be avoided. Do your part!
