Nut Growers Preparing 27th Meeting at Salem

Filbert and walnut growers of Oregon are planning for one of the largest conventions in the history of the Western Nut Growers association, at the 27th annual meeting at Salem December 2 and 3. In addition to the usual educational program, an exceptionally large exhibit of nuts and foods using nut meats is being arranged under the direction of P. C. McLaughlin of Woodburn.

Membership in the association is not necessary to attend any session of the convention, says O. T. McWhorter, secretary-treasurer and extension horticulturist at Oregon State college. McWhorter is now distributing the program for the meeting as approved by President L. R. Pearson of Beaverton. The Tuesday forenoon program will be devoted largely to filbert growing, while walnut topics are listed for the afternoon. The annual banquet will be held that evening at the Marion hotel, with Governor C. A. Sprague as speaker. General topics, including market developments will be considered Wednesday, with the annual business meeting scheduled for the afternoon session.
