BOOKS FOR SERVICE MEN

A nation wide Victory book campaign opened Monday, to collect a million or more books for the soldiers sailors and marines.

Governor Sprague in endorsing the campaign, states: "Soldier morale is undoubtedly one of the potent factors on our fighting front. Believing that books may play a very real part in building that morale, for soldiers as well as citizens, I am happy to endorse the Victory Book campaign. I hope your goal of book gifts for soldiers, sailors and marines may be realized."

Most of us have a relative, or friend already in the service, who appreciate good reading matter. A suggestion, right now, before it slips the mind,—select some books from your collection and send to your nearest library for the boys in service.

Federal Income Tax No. 2

Forms for filing returns of income for 1941 have been sent to persons who filed returns last year. Failure to receive a form, however, does not relieve a taxpayer of his obligation to file his return and pay the tax on time—on or before March 16 if the return is made on the calendar-year basis, as is the case with most individuals.

Forms may be obtained upon request, written or personal, from the offices of collectors and from deputy collectors of internal revenue in the larger cities and towns.

A person should file his return on Form 1040, unless his gross income for 1941 does not exceed \$3,000 and consist wholly of salary, wages, or other compensation for personal services, dividends, interest, rent, annuities, or royalties, in which event he may elect to file on Form 1040A, a simplified form on which the tax may be readily ascertained by reference to a table contained in the form.

The return must be filed with the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the taxpayer has his legal residence or principal place of business on or before midnight of March 16, 1942. The tax may be paid in full at the time of filing the return or in four equal installments, due on or before March 16, June 15, September 15, and December 15.

In making out your income tax return read carefully the instructions that accompany the form. If you need more information, it may be obtained at the office of the collector of internal revenue, deputy collector, or an internal agent in charge.

Remember that single persons or married persons not living with husband or wife, who earn as much as \$14.43 a week for the 52 weeks of the year, and married persons living together who have aggregate earnings of as much as \$28.85 a week for the year, are required to file returns.

The boys who fought the Civil War numbered 2,159,798 and of this number 1,151,438 were 18 years and under and only 46,626 were over 25 years of age. There were 25 under 10 years and 17 was the age in which included the largest number—844,891. The war had many officers of the rank of captain or under and had not attained the age of 21 years. In the World War No. I and No. II, a commissioned officer had to be 21 years old.

But as far as the Civil War was concerned the fighting was done by boys and the phrase "Boys of '61" is a literal expression of truth, and not metaphorical. World War No. I did not want youngsters under 18 and in this one Congress figures 20 years is young enough. The Civil War 15 to 19 years furnished the bulk of the fighting force of the armies of both sides.

General John J. Pershing's report of the Battle Monument Commission showed we had 1,981,701 men of all services in the American Expeditionary Forces, November 11, 1918, or almost one-half of those called to the colors.

In World War No. I, no American made cannon or shells were used by the American first army during the war. All were bought from the French and the English. All tanks used by America were of French or British make.

By April, 1918, a year after our entry, we had three squadrons of airplanes on the front; by armistice time, forty-five squadrons totaling 740 planes, of these, twelve squadrons were equipped with American planes.

World War No. I cost us as much as all of the previous wars. According to General Pershing the cost and duration of the war would have been much less if we had been prepared. We had sufficient warning. The Mexican border incident should have been enough to put us on guard. We were not fully prepared for World War No. II, but one thing is certain, we do not have to ask our allies to furnish us with fighting equipment.

trunks, metal furniture and kitchen cabinets, metal lamps and standards, paper and cordage may also be banned. Better buy now a two year's supply of overshoes, rubbers, etc.

What About Foods?

There is no statistical evidence for food scarcity. In fact, we have on hand a wheat supply ample for over two years. In most markets chicken and lamb are selling for less than a year ago and beef is only very little higher, but pork is way up in price. Prepare to eat more pot roasts and lamb stews; but cut down on eggs, cheese, cream, etc., which are being sent abroad to the soldiers. Fifteen per cent more chickens will be on the market in 1942.

With the exception of tomato soup, the cheaper brands of canned soups are now higher and many canned goods are now scarce. This, however, should be only temporary as the potential supplies of fruits and vegetables are greater than ever. Tin, however, is getting scarce so that the tin can soon may cost more than the food in it!

Fish Is Becoming Scarce

The fish catch for 1941 was about 4,500,000 pounds. This could readily be stepped up to 6 million pounds; but to do so will cost money. Fishing boats are being taken over by the government for mine layers and other purposes; fishermen are frightened of submarines; while these able-bodied men can get in war work ashore paying far more than fishing.

Soap and Fats

When our soldier boys get to Africa, or the Far East, they will want us to send them soap. Hence, wise mothers will now stock up on soap, fats, oils, etc. All these will sell for higher prices if you are able to get them at any price. Bread is now going up one cent a loaf; sugar will be no cheaper; while canned milk, and most package goods will sell at higher prices. This, however, will be due to high labor costs, increased freight rates, and packaging costs—not to a shortage of the food contents.

Housewives should confine purchases to standard goods and experting with substitutes. I gave my family recently 15-cent oleomargarine instead of 40-cent butter and they could not tell the difference. Quit buying crab meat and other imported products which you don't need. I have cut out tea and coffee and feel better for it. If you use any wall paper or floor coverings better buy them now. No hurry about stocking up on cotton goods.

New Opportunities

Every cloud has a silver lining! For instance, a great new industry has developed in Europe—the carrying of messages, packages, etc., by bicycle, and on foot. Much of this is legitimate; but there also is much bootlegging transportation. For instance, notwithstanding the censorship, for one dollar American money anyone can get any letter from Paris to Lisbon and hence to the United States. These "underground" routes carried on by relays of workmen and tourists are giving employment to thousands of people.

The United States offers greater opportunities in devising substitutes and the reconditioning of "worn out" goods. This includes retreading tires, repairing sewing machines, rebuilding vacuum cleaners, radios, and household appliances of all kinds. Small repair shops will open up in every neighborhood. The shoe cobblers will do a big business in 1942 and 1943. The used-automobile market will exceed in activity the stock market. Dealers in second-hand furniture and other products will have a big year in 1942.

Brains are for Use

There may be some small increases in living costs in the months ahead; but those who buy only standard goods and do careful shopping should keep costs down to former figures. Remember—If you insist on the same goods and same grades, it will cost us more to live; but by using sane substitutes we can be as healthy and happy and perhaps live cheaper than during 1941.

Harney and Grant Show More Bang's

The 12-months report on Bang's disease tests in this state shows that 1.28 per cent of the 244,852 animals tested were reactors, which is a fraction of a point increase over the 1.07 percent record made in 1940. Grant county, with 11.5 percent, and Harney with 22.01 percent, showed poorly and were among the few counties in the state that did not show a decline during the year. In 1940, the Grant and Harney percentages were 1.8 and 5.4 respectively, according to the state department of agriculture records.

Wheeler county showed no reactors for the second year; and 16 other counties showed less than 1 per cent reactors: Yamhill .088; Lincoln .21; Polk .33; Clatsop .34; Linn .36; Wasco .36; Clackamas .45; Hood River .466; Douglas .507; Multnomah .52; Josephine .61; Washington .63; Gilliam .68; Lane .79; Tillamook .79 percent; and Benton .92 percent.

Business School Places Students

The Names-Boling Business school in the Woodlark building is doing its part in defense work, having six of its former students holding civil service positions in Washington, D. C. A number more are to leave for Washington soon. In addition, 12 students are in the employ of the 11th civil service district here and in Seattle.

Names-Boling was among the first in Portland to train students specifically for civil service positions.

Home-Town Papers Held Best Read Publications

Home-town papers are read more thoroughly by rural people than any other publications and hence they are the most valuable medium for disseminating farm news, according to AAA committeemen attending the annual conference at Oregon State college. One farmer serving on the education committee of the conference stated that, although his group is always glad to get news in the metropolitan dailies, the news that really counts in reaching a large proportion of the farmers is that used in the county weeklies.

Soils Short Course to Emphasize War Programs

With Oregon farmers planning to bend every effort toward increasing production of vital foods next year with a minimum labor requirement, the most efficient handling of the soil is a fundamental problem, says Dr. W. L. Powers, head of the soils department, in announcing the annual soils short course to be held from Thursday, January 29 to 31.

Special consideration will be given to handling pastures and in applying irrigation for maximum production of food crops. The general division of the program shows soil classification, soil survey, and land use to be considered the first day. Reclamation, improvement of pastures, and small seed production are included on the second day's program. Fertilizing food crops for defense will be the general theme for the third and final day.

Filbert Output Grows Rapidly

Oregon now has approximately 22,500 acres of walnuts and 11,600 acres of filberts, according to estimates contained in the current agricultural situation and outlook report issued by Oregon State college. Average filbert production for the period 1925-1930 was only 162 tons per year. Estimated production for 1941 is 5,000 tons, mostly in Oregon. Total supply of filberts has not increased, however, as imports of filberts decreased from 5140 tons per year, shelled, to 753 tons shelled for the 1940-41 importing year.
