Winter Courses Include Civilian Defense Study

Civilian Defense will motivate many
of the new winter term courses to be
offered by the Portland Extension
Center of the Oregon State System of
Higher Education which opened
Monday, January 5. Classes meet in
the evening from 7:15 to 9:15 in Lin-
coln high school, with the late after-
noon and Saturday morning classes
meeting at the central library.

Engineering drawing and applied
metallurgy will be given. Dietetics
will consider the problems relating to
the planning, purchasing and prepa-
rations of foods, and the household
management course will discuss the
problems of family finance, how to
make the most of money by increas-
ing the purchasing power of the dollar
by careful buying. A class in tex-
tiles which will study fibres and fab-
rics, will be of particular interest as
it will aid the consumer in judging
quality, suitability and economy. First
aid will be taught, also home gard-
ening.

PORTLAND

Oregon Farmers Pledge All-Out For Victory

Now that America is at war, ach-
ievement of the production goals un-
der the food for freedom—now "food
for victory"—program has become
doubly important, said Robert B. Tay-
lor of Adams, chairman of the state
USDA agricultural defense program,
in calling on Oregon farmers to turn
pledged increases in production into
actual production of more eggs, more
milk, more pork and more market-
ing of beef cattle.

Results of the statewide farm-to-
farm sign-up recently conducted by
AAA committeemen show that Ore-
gon farmers have "over subscribed"
the original production goals under
the farm defense program, planning
more than their share of the in-
creased production. But with this
nation actually at war some of these
original goals may even be revised
to meet increased needs, said Taylor.
As shown in the sign-up results, ex-
pected 1942 production of the three
most important commodities, milk,
eggs and pork, well exceeds the origi-
nal goals, the defense board chair-
man announced. An eleven per cent
increase in milk production was
sought and brought a response of a 19
per cent increase planned. The
promised increase in egg produc-
tion is 36 per cent, against a goal of
12 per cent; the 20 per cent pork pro-
duction goal brought a response of 38
per cent.

Authorities Urge Truck Bus Owners to Send in Defense Questionnaires

State and federal authorities have
joined in urging truck and bus own-
ers who have not yet returned their
defense inventory questionnaire cards to
do so immediately, according to
word received today from the secre-
tary of state's office in Salem.

The inventory is for the purpose of
determining what trucks and buses
would be available for hire or lease
by the government for emergency
use. Until this survey has been
completed, complete details of plans
for defense cannot be made, it was
said.

Several hundred cards still are in
the hands of Oregon motor vehicle
owners and these owners are urged
to make all speed in filling out the
cards and returning them to Salem.

Vaccination Time Here For Turkey Breeders

Turkey breeders should be re-vac-
inating their birds for fowl pox,
according to word received from the
poultry department at Oregon State
College by Palmer Townsend, assistant
county agent. As a rule, one vac-
cination will not immunize turkeys for
life as it will in the case of chickens.
An outbreak of fowl pox may occur
in turkeys during the winter or spring
months even though they have been
vaccinated at an early age. N. L.
Bennion, extension poultryman, states
that birds should be re-vaccinated
sometime during the months of De-
cember or January or at least a
month before the hens start to lay.
An outbreak occurring in flocks that
have not been re-vaccinated may ap-
pear in a mild form and is some-
times mistaken for a cold or attrib-
uted to fighting among the toms. A
severe or a mild case of fowl pox will
greatly reduce fertility and cut down
egg production.

Defense Bond Quiz

Q. Who said: I only regret
that I have but one life to lose for
my country?

A. Nathan Hale, who gave his life
for America, like great numbers of
his fellow countrymen. We are only
asked to loan our dollars for De-
fense bonds and stamps to defend
the liberty for which they died.

Q. Where I work there is no pay-
roll allotment plan for the buying of
Defense Savings Bonds and Stamps.
How can I get one started?

A. This depends on your position,
and the kind of organization in
which you are employed. General-
ly speaking, your immediate superior
would be the proper person to receive
your suggestion that you would like
to have a voluntary pay-roll allot-
ment plan introduced. The firm's
bank can supply information about
such a plan.

NOTE—To buy Defense Bonds
and Stamps, go to the nearest post
office, bank, or savings and loan as-
sociation; or write to the Treasurer
of the United States, Washington,
D. C. Also Stamps now are on sale
at retail stores.

Gas Company Official Advises Users Not To Turn Off Main Valve

"Make no attempt to turn off the
main gas valve—simply turn off the
stove burners that are lit, not the
pilot light."

"These are helpful and common
sense instructions," said R. G. Bar-
nett, vice-president and general man-
ager, Portland Gas & Coke Co., and
head of the utilities division of the
civilian defense organization here.

The new directions for users of gas
appliances, ranges, water heaters, re-
frigerators, furnaces and heaters, su-
persede those contained in the an-
nouncement originally released by the
U. S. Office of Civilian Defense
at the onset of the war.

The revised instructions are:
"Make no attempt to shut off the
main gas valve. Simply turn off the
stove burners that are lit, not the
pilot light."

"If the house is badly damaged, the
main gas valve should be shut off."
"Once the main valve is turned off,
for any reason, do not turn it on
again yourself. Call for a trained
man."

"Your local gas company is working
out further detailed directions with
your local defense council. Watch for
these instructions, then follow them."

Navy Offers Experienced Men Immediate Rating

Immediate ratings in the United
States Navy are offered to men with
experience aboard small vessels of
this area who are qualified to man-
craft of the local defense forces op-
erating in local waters.

Seamen, engineers, radiomen, cooks,
yeomen and other classes of expe-
rienced men are needed at once, of-
ficials of the Thirtieth Naval District
announced today. Engineers with
experience on either diesel or gasoline
engines will be used. Age limit is
17 to 50.

Qualified men with this experience
are requested to apply immediately at
the nearest Navy recruiting station.
They are to ask for Class M-2, which
includes enlistments for this local de-
fense work, officials explained.

No further naval training will be
given the recruits before they go into
service and ratings which may pay
as high as \$126 monthly are offered.
In addition to this, allowances are
made for clothing, food and quarters.
Men with dependents or families are
additionally provided for, also.

Officials pointed out that recruits
under the M-2 classification will be
serving their country in waters fami-
lar to them and near their home
ports. Meet for these local defense
forces are badly needed now and all
qualified persons are asked to inquire
about the opportunities.

Seal Sales Being Reported by Secretary

County workers over the state are
still gathering in returns from the
1941 Christmas seal sale, according to
Miss Elsie Winters, state seal secre-
tary for the Oregon Tuberculosis
association.

Twelve counties have already ex-
ceeded their gross totals of last year,
Miss Winters predicts the state will
reach its \$90,000 goal, before complete
returns are all in.
