First Aid Training Emphatically Necessary In Case of Emergency

BY ALBERT ABSHER Take Red Cross first aid training, as it may enable you to save a life sometime—maybe some one near and dear to you. In case of an injury where one of the neck arteries is severed one may bleed to death within a minute. Do you know that such bleeding is easily stopped by placing your finger against the artery below the wound. Blood in the arteries flow from the heart. Such knowledge may help you to save your own life as well as that of some one else.

The course of study embraces the proper method to be employed in giving artificial respiration in the case of asphyxiation and drowning, or in the care of the burned, proper treatment in case of poisoning, how to bandage and many other things that may save life, limb and the general care of the victim before the arrival of medical aid. All students in the upper school grades should be given this first aid training in conjunction with their athletic training or in a health course.

The Red Cross first-aid training is just as important in peace time as in war and the service man and the civilian alike should be trained to aid the injured.

In most accident cases plenty of spectators may be had but few offer to help the victim and often those who attempt to give aid do not know what to do. Such training is properly labeled first aid as this assistance if given immediately may mean the difference between life and death to the injured.

Mind Disease Serious Menace to Civilization

Life expectations in 1900 was 49 years and today it is 60. That means more children are born today will reach the age of one and each year thereafter. For example, heart trouble kills more people than in 1900 for it is a disease of the aged and there are more people of the older ages. There are more than eleven hundred thousand persons attending to the medical needs of the people of the United States. It is estimated three-fourths of our population will be ill in various degrees during the year. The cause of illness comes in many forms. Probably our mental state is the biggest single cause of illness. The disease of the mind is a serious menace to civilization. It is stated by authority one person out of every twenty-two has to be placed in an asylum at some time or another for mental disorder. Mental disorder occurs eight times often than tuberculosis among our people.

Motor Clubs Head Urges Recording of Tire Numbers

Recommendation that all Oregon automobile owners immediately record the serial number of their tires and keep the record in a safe place was made this week by Dr. E. E. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association. "By this means you will be able to give police exact identification of the property in event of tire theft, and they will be able to return stolen tires to their rightful owners on recovery," Dr. McDaniel pointed out. "Every tire has a different serial number which is found on the sidewall, usually near the name of the manufacturer. A record of these numbers is absolutely necessary if police are to locate owners of recovered tires. There are other steps that motorists can take individually to protect themselves against the tire rustlers. If your spare tire key is separate from your ignition key, make sure that your spare is locked and carry the key with you when leaving your car on a parking lot. If at all possible, keep your car in a locked garage at night, and never park in a dark, deserted sections or alleys.

Civic Review Booklet Published by an Attorney Of Portland Interesting

The Civic Review booklet published by the City of Portland is a very comprehensive resume of the accomplishments of the various departments of the city government. It is interesting to note in 1931 the City had two judges, four clerks and two bailiffs in the Municipal Court, who handled 17,041 cases with 325 appeals and collected in fines \$99,839.37 with an expense of \$21,369.52 and in 1940 with one judge and one bailiff less the court handled 59,357 cases with 125 appeals and collected in fines \$287,576.75 with a cost of \$17,834.96. Since 1934 one judge has handled the work of the Municipal court and has tried more cases than the two judges did. It is also startling to note the City Council has been a prolific legislative body. Since April 7, 1854, the Council has passed more than 75,000 ordinances. It is also gratifying to note these ordinances are being indorsed for easy reference.

The delinquent tax situation is alarming. The records show that there is six times more money tied up in delinquent tax in 1940 than in 1931 and that the 1940 delinquency is twice that of 1939. The biggest single bonded debt of the city has in the water bonds which is approximately 44 percent of the \$31,965,907.76 city debt. The city debt amounts to \$86.87 per capita and if the County, Port of Portland and School District No. 1 is added it amounts to \$133.65 per capita.

Spruce Veneer Plant Bands Very Convenient to Grow Bedding Plants

Few of us realize the check or damaging effect of taking young plants from open soil and transplanting them. Some plants in the greenhouse apparently are not as much affected but we know from long experience that asters, mums, peas and many others show this checking affected strikingly when transplanted even in a protected greenhouse. Planting outdoors will check them severely. The one objection to flat grown bedding plants so largely sold to home gardeners is that frequently half the summer is necessary to re-establish them after digging them up and transplanting. The difficulty is met by growing them in pots, but pots cost real money and are easily broken and the soil dries out so fast in spring that it is necessary to watch them continuously. The cheapest and best method is to plant them in wooden plant boxes. Then when plants are put out without the heavy check that follows they get into bearing earlier. Further more plants, grown in bands will require only half the watering of those grown in round or cone-shaped pots. This is because the space between the pots give a greater evaporation surface while with the square bottomless bands the one evaporation that takes place is from the surface of the earth which is Nature's way. Plant bands are made from 1 1/2 inches to four inches square and from 2 1/2 inches to 4 inches deep. These wooden plant bands are manufactured exclusively by the Coast Veneer Co., foot of North Pittsburg street, Portland. They are made from the finest clear spruce obtainable. They are made collapsible and great numbers can be packed in small space. Their acceptance has been instantaneous for they fill a long needed want to the gardener. They are shipped in carload lots for use in the eastern market. Rapidly pots and paper containers are being displaced by wooden bands. Mr. Day of the Coast Veneer Co. invented the spruce veneer plant band. Its development and manufacture provides a real industry in the Pacific Northwest.
