

### Extension Units Study Nutrition

To meet today's demand for better health and improved diet, 500 members of Extension Units are studying nutrition under the direction of Faye Nichols, home demonstration agent.

Volunteer leaders from these groups will be trained in leader training meetings on the function of protective foods in the diet, the relation of food to health, adequate diets for various income levels, and planning the family food supply. These leaders will give this information to their local groups.

The rural women feel that nutrition is a community and national problem as well as an individual and family problem, and that homemakers have a great responsibility in building the health of the family through good food habits.

The study groups are located at North Plains, Forest Grove, Buxton, Dixie Mountain, Lelsville, Norwood, Glenwood, Tualatin, Gales Creek, Scholls, Rock Creek, Cedar Mill, Pumpkin Ridge, Tigard, and Cherry Grove.

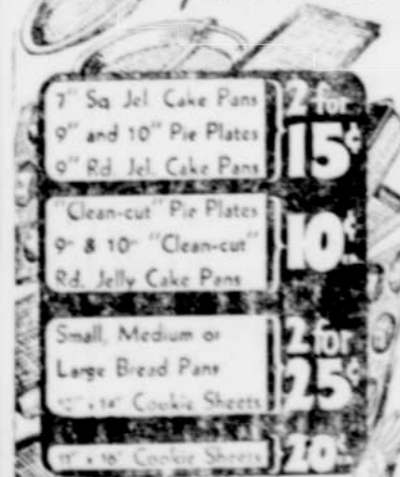
