Fire Equipment and Arm Bands Soon Available

Advice has been received from the OCD Regional office in San Francisco that under present plans fire fighting equipment to be distributed under the provision of the \$100,000,000 Civilian Defense bill recently passed by Congress will be placed in a Pool and will be subject to call for use in any area where an emergency may exist. Such fire equipment will remain the property of the United States Government.

Allocation of the fire equipment probably will be made under the direction of the OCD Regional office; in Oregon by Governor Charles A. Sprague as State Director of Civilian Defense and in Metropolitan Portland under Mayor Earl Riley. No plans for distribution have yet been received.

Information also has been received from the Regional Office that arm bands for all qualified enrolled workers will be distributed without cost. Supplies for the west coast are expected to be available shortly. Penalties fixed for unauthorized wearing of OCD insignia are a \$100 fine and or six months imprisonment.

Aid to Persons with

Impaired Hearing

Because persons with impaired hearing are doubly handicapped, in the event of an air raid, in that they cannot hear, and in a blackout cannot see, special instructions to Air Raid Wardens have been issued from Washington:

Air Raid Wardens should (1) take a census of all people who cannot hear warning signals; (2) urge those who cannot hear doorbells and telephone bells to install signal lights so that they could be reached in an emergency; (3) urge those living alone to leave a passkey with a nearby neighbor and (4) warn the hard of hearing that for their own protection and those around them, arrangements should be made for warnings to be given them by two or more people.

Button Down the Hatches

All civilian defense workers should be warned not to discuss locations of Aircraft Warning Service installations. No information should be published in regard to the numbers, designations or movement of any military personnel connected with the operation of this service and in giving publicity on observation posts the exact location should not be given. The Aircraft Warning Service is a highly important arm of Civilian Defense and every care should be taken that information is not divulged that will permit any saboteur to put installations of this service out of operation.

Gen. Washington's Medal of Honor

"The road to glory in a patriot army and a free country is open to all," declared General Washington in his order of the day August 7, 1782, instituting the first American badge for military merit.

His act was in recognition of "bravery, fidelity and good conduct" among the non-commissioned officers and private soldiers in the Continental Army. Thus was established the Order of the Purple Heart.

Individual valor has always been a distinguishing trait of the American soldier. In the lapse of more than a century and a half between Bunker Hill, Valley Forge and Stony Point to Pearl Harbor, Bataan and the Macassar Straits the roster of those men who have traveled the road to glory furnishes a brilliant record of patriotism and sacrifice.

In the first dark hours of the present war their heroic deeds have thrilled their countrymen and illumined the way to ultimate victory—inspiring hope of a triumph not only for the United Nations but for downtrodden peoples throughout the world.

No gold, silver or bronze blazoned from the breasts of the heroes Washington intended to honor. Read his general order:

"The General ever desirous to cherish virtuous ambition in his soldiers, as well as to foster and encourage every species of military merit, directs that when any singularly meritorious action is performed, the author of it shall be permitted to wear on his facings over the left breast the figure of a heart in purple cloth, or silk, edged with narrow lace or binding. Not only instances of unusual gallantry, but also of extraordinary fidelity and essential service in any way shall meet with due reward. . . . The road to

JUSTIFIED — In God's sight JUST-AS-IF-WE-HAD-NEVER-SINNED.

But I was rough—All these years since, the Holy Spirit has been showing me my many sins. The old Adam in me is like Johnson grass—it keeps sending up shoots. Looking toward the century mark and after more than half a century of service under the banner of the cross, John the Apostle said the same—"If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." And he gave the rule for getting back into step—"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:8-9. God wanted me. May Christ become your Savior and then your Cheer - Hope - Joy - Peace - Wisdom- Strength all the day all the way.

Subsequent to the Revolution the Order of the Purple Heart seems to have fallen into disuse and no further awards were made. Its revival was suggested at the time of the observance of the 200th anniversary of Washington's birth, and its reinstitution was announced by the War Department February 22, 1932. Under changes in Army regulations the Purple Heart is authorized to persons who "while serving in the Army of the United States perform any singularly meritorious act of extraordinary fidelity or essential service." Wounds received in action are included in this category.

Babson Urges All Women To Have Trades

Babson Park, Florida, Feb. 20—I have recently been studying the catalogs of colleges—especially those for women. I find the inclusion of certain First Aid and other war courses; but otherwise the subjects covered are the same as if no war existed. I find almost no courses—other than secretarial—which prepare students to secure an income for themselves after the war.

What are Colleges Teaching?

When talking with college presidents they ask me why I am so anxious about what will happen to the students after the war is over? Some say: "Our task is to get the students to register and to graduate them. The girls will get married and the boys will get drafted, so why worry?" They also complain that gifts are falling off, the income from endowments is declining and they simply cannot afford to take on any new instructors or experiment with new courses.

All the above may be true, but I am sure that if college presidents realize the terrific changes which our young people are to face after World War II they will find some way to help them. Just as our youths were allowed to think America was preparing "for defense—short of war" and then were to be drafted "for only one year" and under no circumstances "would be sent out of the country," these same young people are now being lured into a happy dream as to economic conditions after the war. Only six months ago I was told at Washington "we can lick Japan with our hands tied behind our backs." May we not now be getting similar false ideas as to what Japan and Germany will do to us industrially after we lick them in a military way?

After-War Conditions

I now have no fears of Communism or Nazism. The so-called capitalist system will continue; stocks and bonds will not be wiped out. The government may take over banking and certain other big industries; but more new privately-owned industries will rise up to take their places. But axes on stocks and bonds may be terrible. Those who expect to live on the interest of what they inherit may get a very sad surprise. Other people—the so-called middle class—will be crushed by inflation caused by the huge government debt that this country will have after World War II.

The above means that—married or single—almost every woman reader will be obliged to earn some money if she hopes to maintain her present standard of living. And why not? Our great grandmothers raised large families of children without any conveniences and yet earned considerable money to help out their husbands' meager income. It might have been weaving or sewing, or by tending other people's children, or by nursing the sick, or by helping tend her husband's store, or by having hens or pigs or hives of bees of her own.

The fittest Will Survive

For not many years after World War II will women have either money to take bridge lessons, or time to play bridge! A few years of "prosperity" will follow during the reconstruction period; but after that—look out! Those who have some enterprise and are good workers will enjoy a fair standard of living; but those who expect to live lives of ease, will be greatly disappointed. The days of play boys and glamour girls will be over. Once more the Bible doctrine that "those who do not work shall not eat" (See II Thess. 2:10) will again be the good old rule; it is the law by which civilization grew. The fittest will survive, reproduce and be happy, but God help the rest!

Our nation is to be burdened by a terrific debt which will raise havoc with every family whether the debt is paid or defaulted. If it is paid, we all will be crushed by high taxes; if it is redeemed with newly printed money, we all will suffer from high prices; while if it is defaulted, then "good night" for our banks and insurance companies which now are the principal holders of these bonds. Employment, except at low wages, will be very difficult due to the terrible competition which is coming from Europe and Asia after the war is over. We can disarm our enemies; but we can't prevent them from working 12 hours a day at 10 cents a day and underselling us in all world and many domestic markets.

Watch Your Children's Educations

I am constantly being asked, "What can we parents do to prepare for such events?" My answer is: "Have all your children get a useful education. Have even the girls learn some trade, art, or profession, by which they can help out their husbands' income or 'pinch-hit' for him if he is out of work or ill. Never mind if these girls don't get a college 'degree'. State University degrees are pretty to look at, but they are too stiff to eat, too small for clothes, and too frail for shingling the roof!"

War Tests Prove Blue Illumination Unsuitable

War department tests have disclosed that blue illumination is not suitable for blackout lights on motor vehicles and instead, red illumination has been adopted as the official standard, according to word received here by Earl Snell, secretary of state and member of the national five-man highway traffic advisory committee to the war department.

War department tests revealed that blue illumination is more easily seen from the air and is less helpful to ground activity than any other color, Snell said. After testing all colors in the visible spectrum, it was found that deep red illumination is least visible from the air and is best suited to preserving dark adaptation of the eyes.

As a result of the war department tests, orders have been issued to use red instead of blue or any other color whenever color is used to lower intensity of lights for blackout conditions. The department also stressed the importance of having all light sources hooded so as not to project any light above the horizontal.

Federal Income Tax No. 7

In the event of failure to make and file an income tax return as required by law within the prescribed time, a certain percentage of the amount of the tax is required to be added to the tax unless failure to file the return within the prescribed time is shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioner to be due to reasonable cause and not to wilful neglect.

The amount to be added to the tax is 5 percent if the failure is for more than thirty days, with an additional 5 percent for each additional thirty days or fraction thereof during which failure to file a return continues, not to exceed 25 percent in the aggregate.

A taxpayer who files a tardy return and wishes to avoid the addition to the tax for delinquency must make an affirmative showing of all facts, alleged as a reasonable cause for failure to file the return on time, in the form of an affidavit which should be attached to the return. Alleged ignorance of the law does not constitute reasonable cause for delinquency.

Taxpayers should make every effort to file their returns within the time prescribed by law and thus avoid the possibility of the additions to the tax for delinquency in filing returns.

Do not forget that single persons or married persons not living with husband or wife, who earn as much as \$1443 a year for the 52 weeks of the year, and married persons living together who have aggregated earnings of as much as \$28.85 a week for the year, are required to file returns.

Cooking To Preserve Food Value

Today the art of cooking is more than the production of a tasty dish attractively served; it also includes the conserving of food values. While certain nutrient losses during cooking are unavoidable, considerable quantities of these protective substances are thrown away every day.

Vegetables are frequently served raw, in which case all the food nutrients, color, flavor and texture are preserved. Most frequently, however, they are cooked in order to develop flavor and increase digestibility. The nutrients are best preserved by cooking the vegetables in a small amount of boiling water, for as short a time as possible, and removing them from the water if any remains in the pan as soon as they are done. The water drained from cooked vegetables should be served in gravies, sauces or soups; otherwise valuable food substances will be lost.

Practical suggestions for preservation of vitamin values in cooking and serving may be summed up:

Do not stir air into foods while cooking.
Do not put them through a sieve while still hot.
Do not use soda in cooking green vegetables.
In boiling foods, raise the temperature to the boiling point as rapidly as possible.
Do not use long cooking processes when shorter methods are feasible.
Prepare chopped fruit and vegetable salads just before serving.
Serve raw frozen foods immediately after thawing.

Red Cross May Get Cigarette Tax Money

A suggestion has been made that wholesale and retail cigarette dealers get together and urge the state tax commission to transfer the \$45,000 of accumulated cigarette tax to the Red Cross. The money is now on deposit in the state treasury department.

The tax commission last Saturday asked for legal advice as to how the fund should be disposed of. The commission previously indicated that the tax could not be refunded to the wholesalers and jobbers for the reason that it actually was paid by the consumer.
