Merchants have been sternly warned that this practice of a 'full-line forcing" is subject to prosecution under the anti-trust laws Deputy Attorney General Thurman W. Arnold has been put in charge of the investigation and assurance is given that the law will "clamp down" on every merchant who resorts to such prac-
