Mrs. America Meets The War

Pretty soon tomato catsup and
chili sauce will be wearing different
caps. Long-familiar closures made
of tinplate (lead and tin) can no longer
be manufactured for certain glass
containers. Production is already
specifically prohibited for crown caps
for bottled beer and soft drinks and
home-use jars for jellies and preser-
ves. Many more articles will soon
be added to the list.

Pass this statistic along to your
husband. One razor blade a week
(the amount available under the re-
cent curtailment order) is what the
average man uses, restriction or not.
And also let him ponder this: Even
under the War Production Board or-
der, more blades will be manufactur-
ed in 1942 than in any year before
1940.

It's time for spring housecleaning
and this year Mrs. America should
be inspired to do a thorough job.
The War Production Board again is
asking for Americans to scour attics,
cellars, and garages for salvage. Here
is a partial list of old household ar-
ticles which the government wants
you to look for: electric cords, old

per screens, ice skates, old rubber
overshoes and bathing caps, andirons,

THIS IS THE STORY OF CARBOLOY

How a Most Strategic Material of the War—Invented
in Germany—Was Made Available to the United Nations

More Precious Than Diamonds in War Production... Carboloy is an American trademark for cemented tungsten-carbide, an alloy second only to diamonds in hardness, more precious than diamonds as a vital material in America's war program. It is used for the tips of cutting tools, and for wear-resistant dies. Carboloy is used in small quantities; it is difficult to make and difficult to use—but it has never been scarce in modern times. There is no scarcity now.

Invented in Germany—Krupp Protected by U. S. Patents... Cemented carbide was invented in Germany—it belonged to Krupp of Germany, and this made all the rest of the world Krupp's customer. In this country, Krupp was protected by patent grants from the United States.

General Electric Creates Independent Production... The General Electric Company two years before this had begun research on tungsten-carbide and foresaw its importance in industrial production. For immediate use in its own plants and for easier availability to others, General Electric undertook the long and arduous negotiations for the American rights. Limited rights were obtained in 1928, with Krupp continuing to export the material to its United States customers—a business which languished, however, as General Electric painstakingly developed its own Carboloy technique. This paved the way for General Electric to make the United States entirely independent of Germany for its cemented tungsten-carbide supply as early as 1935.

American Tool Costs Half That of German... From the start, two totally different businesses were involved. Krupp, originally ex-

ported cemented carbides in chunks—and was unsuccessful. General Electric—and its subsidiary, Carboloy Co., Inc.—found it necessary to develop a complete engineering and manufacturing service, making various types of Carboloy equipped tools, training men in their use, and offering to its customers a specialized and successful production technique. For purposes of fair comparison, a typical German cemented carbide tool in 1928 cost \$22.26 in the United States, while a comparable American Carboloy tool cost \$11.11.

Loss to General Electric for Many Years—Art Taught to Industry... In times of peace—and 1928 was such a time—the measure of success of industrial adventure is to be found in profit to the adventurer. By such a measure, Carboloy could not be called successful. Initial expenses were great. For a time the Company lost at the rate of \$1000 a day, and once had an operating deficit of more than a million dollars. One of the major contributing reasons was the continuing high cost of development, standardization, and training. In 1936—37 alone, training courses were given to 10,000 men in industry. Moreover, six major price reductions were made in the face of operating losses, until the standard tool blank had been reduced in price 90 per cent.

Faith and Perseverance... Depression was still another reason—labor-saving tools could not be sold to industry or labor at any price. But General Electric, with determination that now seems providential, kept on—increasing its

capacity, granting new licenses, condoning instances of unlicensed production, staying ahead of its market.

Production Multiplied forty-five Times in Four Years... Cemented tungsten-carbide could easily have been a source of weakness here, as it was in England, had it not been for General Electric's policy of continued expansion. In 1939, the production of the Carboloy Company was less than 20,000 lbs.; in 1940, it was 55,000 lbs.; in 1941, it was 163,000—and in December came Pearl Harbor. Now, in 1942, the Company's production is going at a rate that is 45 times that of only four years ago.

British Dependent upon Us... By contrast, British companies, which had been content to continue as customers of Krupp, found themselves cut off from the vital material when Poland was invaded. But the General Electric Company was able to supply substantial quantities to British industry immediately and since then has continuously filled British orders. It has, in like manner, filled Canada's requirements since 1936. It is currently supplying Canada, Russia, and other United Nations. All this in addition to supplying the greatly expanded needs of American industry.

An Inspirational Story of American Industry... Thus, the story of Carboloy does not end in "too little and too late." Like many previously untold stories of American industry, it continues, a sturdy and inspiring example of public service born of private enterprise, and characterized by hard work, ingenuity, investment, research, risk, and courage—a familiar pattern on this side of the Atlantic. Federal Power Commission has said: "If the tragic story of the private power companies of 'too little and too late' is repeated in the power field, we will have more loss of life and quite possible—lose the war itself."

"Power planning for war or peace goes far beyond existing power and industrial facilities. War-time power needs cannot wait until specific power demands for power develop."

"A vote for the PUD will place your district in position to buy power facilities of the area. Thus, the PUD can exercise its priority and preference as a public body under Federal law to a guaranteed supply of low-cost Bonneville power for expanding existing and new industrial loads."

"It will make possible the placing of industries in rural and semi-rural areas." New industries will come to Washington County. Vote for PUD.

Why do the PUD Sponsors want to form the PUD? To establish a legal district with board of directors to organize and administer same.

Are the Bonds to pay for the system to be paid by taxes? No. They are to be Revenue Bonds and will be paid solely from revenue from the system. Oregon law, 1941-Sec. 114-255.

Will property owned by PUD pay taxes? Yes. Oregon law, 1941. PUD... shall be assessed and taxed in same manner and for same purposes as private corporations furnishing electric power to the public.

What is guaranteed source of power for system after purchase? A 20-year contract with Bonneville Power Administration when we vote the PUD.

Will Bonneville operate PUD Electric System after purchase? No. It will be directed locally by Washington County Rural PUD and managed by an experienced Power Executive who will be responsible for the efficient administration of the District, as is required by Oregon law. Remember to vote for PUD May 15.

Will present employees lose their jobs? No. All employees necessary in its operation will be retained by the PUD.

Who can vote on PUD? Every registered voter in proposed PUD may vote.

Are there any PUD's in successful operation now? Yes. Twelve are now operating successfully in Washington.

Have PUD's in operation in Washington reduced rates? Yes. They all reduced rates as soon as they received Bonneville power. For example Grays Harbor PUD reduced rates 36% when Bonneville power came. We are now paying the Power company \$6.14 for electricity that costs \$4.85 in Grays Harbor PUD and Forest Grove. This will be a saving for you of \$15.48 annually or 21%. Almost enough to enable every home in the PUD to buy annually a \$25 War Bond.

What about wages and working conditions of labor under PUD operation? In Oregon the law provides that all labor employed by a Peoples' Utility District or by any contractor or subcontractor shall be paid at not less than the minimum scale of wages prevailing nearest to the district.

Who are the Sponsors of the PUD? Grange and Farmers' Union.

Know the facts about your PUD. After you know the facts, pass this circular on to your neighbors and talk to them about your PUD.

The Sponsors urge the full co-operation of every voter in the district between now and the date of election, May 15.
