The 13th annual reunion of the
Bilyeu family will be held next Sun-

The demand for stenographers
in government service and defense
industries has been responsible for
an increased interest in classes in
typing and shorthand at the Univer-
sity of Oregon, it was announced
Thursday by Dr. Victor P. Morris,
dean of school of business adminis-
tration.

A total of 333 students took advan-
tage of the university's offering of
these courses during the past school
year. Registration in the shorthand
classes reached a cumulative total
of 163, with 132 women and 31 men.
Typing enrollment aggregated 170
students, 128 of whom were women
and 42 were men.

The business administration school
has received many more requests for
students, especially women, to fill
stenographic positions than it has
been able to supply, Dean Morris
said. Salaries are also on the in-
crease for this type of work with ex-
panding opportunities for lucrative
employment he added.



Mrs. America Meets the War

Yes, Mrs. America, you can still
decorate your baked hams with
cloves. An increase in the imports
from Zanzibar recently built up our
reserves of this spice so that there'll
be enough for two years with cer-
tain restrictions.

See a pin and be sure you pick
it up if you want to help make the
nation's stock of pins last. As you
know, these are among items for
which the use of copper is banned,
and the steel supply for straight pins
has been cut 60 percent. So don't
sweep stray pins into the dustpan.
Be sure to salvage all pins that come
fastened in clothes from the clean-
er or in your husband's fresh shirts
from the laundry. Keep pinches
handy for the convenience of the
family deposits of pins.

Homemakers residing in an over-
crowded defense area can help solve
this housing problem by renting any
extra rooms to war workers. All
available space in those sections
must be utilized, and the renting of
rooms will be of assistance to em-
ployees in war industries. In Eng-
land there is compulsory billeting
for war workers, and unoccupied
houses have been commandeered. It
is hoped that neither practice will
have to be adopted in this country.

Gardeners, better look out for the
care of your tools as much as you
are concerned with the weeds. Gar-
dening shears, hose reels and lawn
sprinklers will be hard to get. Re-
strictions on the use of iron and steel
and the banning of copper for their
manufacture will make it difficult
to obtain new implements. Conse-
quently, it's a wise gardener who
keeps his tools clean and protected
from rust and corrosion.

That happy custom of carving at
the dinner table looks as if it may
not be what it used to be. In the
future the only metals that can be
used for these sets are gold and sil-
ver.
