It takes critical times like these to make us realize what our American way of life really consists of and what it would mean if we lost it.

A unique advertising campaign launched a few weeks ago shows the way the wind is blowing today. A well-known food manufacturer took four pages in a home economics journal to sell home economics teachers, not his food, but free enterprise. It shows that this man, as do many others, considers the fate of our free enterprise system far more important than his own profit. To quote from his message:

"The American way of life is based on four fundamental principles: freedom of speech, freedom of religious belief, freedom of the press, and freedom to choose the form and personnel of government.

Foodstuffs Condemned

Sanitary inspections made last month by state department of agriculture representatives resulted in the seizure and condemnation of an unusually large quantity of foodstuffs. Most of the seizures were due to presence of weevil in the products. About 125 pounds of dried fruits and 36 sacks of cereals were condemned; also 20 pounds of peas that were infested with worms. Cracks and chips caused condemnation of 52 pieces of utensils and dishes in places where food is prepared or served.

License Rumor False

The state department of agriculture had a new one to contend with this week. A nurseryman reported that he had heard that the department was not issuing new licenses during the war period. Department officials were quick to spike the rumor—and license fees are due as usual. The nursery license year starts September 1.

requirements. Stocks on hand compare favorably with a year ago standing for the last month of record at about \$6,730,000 barrels. But automobile users even outside present restricted areas are bound to be pinched unless production of gasoline rises. For the last month of record it was some 300,000 barrels less than for the corresponding period last year. This unfavorable comparison will probably continue until the German submarines are eliminated. Less gas for all except military needs will bring distinct changes in methods of doing business and in personal ways of living.

Oil Securities
Prices in the oil industry have been the best for many years. Gross income is rising although, on account of taxes, the net is off. However, present dividend requirements are in the main covered. Oil shares have held up remarkably well and continue to make a better showing than the general market. Remember also that the producing companies constitute a good inflation hedge.

Oil stocks should essentially be classified a peace stocks. Hence, I should expect to see both the producing and distributing oil companies do much better after the war. If your investment portfolio contains a few good oil stocks you can consider them as constituting a step in the right direction come more war, peace or inflation.

Oregon Rubber Shipment Totals 56 Carloads Week

Rubber collected in the salvage campaign in Oregon is being shipped out of the state at the rate of 56 carloads a week, each car averaging 30 tons. Cliff Radloff, in charge of the shipment, said Thursday.

Nearly 11,000 tons of scrap rubber have been collected in Oregon, but the campaign must continue, Hamilton Corbett, director of the salvage campaign in Portland announced.

"Everyone who has any amount of rubber, however small, should turn it in at a filling station or other designated collection depot, he said. The rubber is being shipped to Fort Snelling at Minneapolis, Minn., where it is sorted and routed to reclamation plants.

St. Helen's Hall Classes Stress U. S. War Need

Departments of study to be offered in 1942-43 at St. Helens Hall Junior college have been announced in the newly published college catalogue which emphasizes the importance of college education in rebuilding a new and stronger America.

Among departments offering courses based directly on the war effort are nursing, home economics, including a new course on care of large groups of children in case of air raid of evacuation; secretarial studies, including a one-year medical secretary curriculum to train girls to act as laboratory office assistants in physicians' offices.

With increased opportunities for women on newspaper, special emphasis will be given the journalism department.

Art courses for 1942-43 include survey of creative arts, design, modeling, drawing, painting and composition. A special tie-up between art and home economics departments is available for students interested in a designing career.

Courses in drama, a department emphasized by St. Helens Hall Junior college for several years, will be taught according to the Stanislavski method, used in most Eastern professional dramatic schools. The method both trains students for the stage and enables them to meet easily awkward situations of real life. Carolyn Bowers Collett, head of the drama department, studied the Stanislavski method under Madame Marie Ouspenskaya in New York city. Other departments to offer work this year will be English, social sciences, science, foreign languages and physical education.

School to Open Early

Because of the request of students and the demand for trained office personnel on the part of industry and civil service requirements, the Names-Boling Business school is beginning its fall term August 31, a week earlier than usual. The night school term begins September 1.

Dental College Aim to Help Offset Shortage of Civilian Dentists

North Pacific college of Oregon in an effort to offset a shortage of civilian dentists caused by the heavy drain of the army and navy, has adopted a program of continuous instruction for the duration of the national emergency. This year-around instruction will permit each student to complete his four academic years in three calendar years.

Dr. Herbert Miller, president of the school, states that war service will absorb all physically fit dental school graduates in the next few years. These men are eligible for army or navy commissions immediately upon receiving their degrees. High school graduates in casting about for a future profession should carefully consider the North Pacific College of Oregon, which offers courses in Dentistry, Dental and Medical Assisting and Dental Hygiene.

Dental Hygiene, Dental and Medical Assistance courses are for women and are somewhat comparable to the graduate nurse service with more desirable working hours.

North Pacific College, an institution of human service, is itself an instance of the growth that responds to necessity and keeps pace with science. No finer humanitarian work is done in Portland, especially for needy children, in the dental clinic of the college.

The next session for freshman dental students will begin September 28.
