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Victory Gardens

This is the time of the year when gardens are most likely to be neglected. The first enthusiasm has by this time worn off, vacation time is here or soon to be here and the family interests are somewhere else other than in the garden. A few days neglect at this time may turn the garden over to the insect army that is always ready to go to work. One of the serious pests to contend with at this time of the year is the 12-spotted cucumber beetle. This is the little yellow ladybug-like insect with 12 black spots on its back. They are extremely damaging to squash, beans, cucumbers, and a few other garden crops. Dusting or spraying with some kind of material carrying pyrethrum is usually an effective control measure.

Where groups of home gardeners are having difficulty controlling some of these pests demonstrations in dusting and spraying for pest control may be arranged with the county extension staff. These are not carried on an individual basis but with neighborhood groups.

Frequent inquiries are being made at this time about blight on tomatoes and potatoes. Gardeners and commercial growers both are remembering the 1941 season when, beginning late in August, potatoes and tomatoes alike were virtually wiped out in Washington county by this one disease.

Late blight is not the same as the disease numerous people are inquiring about at this time. There is a blight that attacks tomatoes which causes the vines to turn yellow with a plant dying here and there. This is not the late blight which was so

injurious a year ago. This yellowing and dying of the plant cannot be controlled with any spraying or dusting. The only remedy is to pull up and burn the infected plants.

The brown discoloration around the blossom end of the tomato itself which sometimes may take up half of the fruit is not a blight but is caused by a lack of moisture.

Late blight makes the plant look just about as if frost had hit it. It usually starts with the tip leaves burning black and becoming droopy. If weather conditions are favorable for the development of the disease it continued through the whole plant. It will always affect more than one isolated plant but sometimes may attack only a part of a patch if weather conditions prevent its spread.

Dusting with a copper lime dust or spraying with bordeaux will accomplish some measure of control. It is inadvisable to start using these remedies unless blight begins to develop. If cold wet weather should occur toward the last of August or early September it may be advisable to use these materials to prevent another disastrous season. Weather conditions will largely determine if we are to have or not to have serious late blight infection in the potato and tomato crop.
