Bolivar Plan Realized

Washington was the leader of the military forces of the thirteen English colonies for eight years in their independence effort; Simon Bolivar was the leader of the Spanish colonies now known as Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, Bolivia and Peru for fifteen years; and Jos6 de San Martin was the military leader who delivered Chile and Argentina from the Spanish rule.

These South American leaders did not succeed in welding the various Spanish colonies into a single unit as did Washington. It is thought Bolivar could have done so if he had resorted to force of arms.

Bolivar like Washington was a member of a wealthy family. Bolivar lost all of his wealth in his war with Spain at the beginning of hostilities. He had the advantage of Washington in that he had received splendid education in Europe. He was much younger than Washington, only 23, when the war started. He died at 48 a very much disappointed man in his failure to unite his people into a single nation as did Washington.

Bolivar's prophetic vision has in part been born out as to North and South America. He urged the building of the Panama Canal and the union of the American Republics. He even took steps to form such a union and invited all the American nations to send representatives to a congress in Panama. The Congress actually met with a failure. Today these same nations have had several such meetings and they have been developing the understanding Bolivar hoped for when he called his congress in Panama.

Bottleneck Strikes Continue

Strikes continue to pile up regardless of the pledges of labor leaders and the mounting disgust of the American people. August topped all previous months in the number of war industry stoppages. A total of 229 strikes, involving 7944 men, were called during this one month and as a result 2,130,824 more valuable man-hours were lost to the Allied Nations.

Wm. H. Davis, Chairman of the War Labor Board, states that this increase is not alarming because it is such a small percentage in the relation of man-hours lost to number of man-hours worked. But, when 81 workers engaged in a jurisdictional strike delayed completion of a \$60,000,000 alloy steel mill and held up 750,000 tons of steel production for four months, the seriousness of these bottleneck strikes immediately become apparent.

In war terms, would Mr. Davis agree that the desertion of a regiment of troops in the face of the enemy was unimportant because the proportion of the deserters to the total armed forces was infinitesimal?

The Truth About Rubber

Babson Bullish on Rubber Securities

Gloucester, Mass., October 23—I am just returning from a trip. Reports gathered from high sources confirm what I have always believed namely, that there will be "tires for all." My readers know that last Winter while in Florida I made numerous tire experiments and wrote optimistically on the situation. I was severely criticized for emphasizing the necessity for automobile transportation and in forecasting that there would be plenty of recapping for everyone. Recent events confirm exactly what I have said from the very first.

Tire Companies Waking Up
Encouraged by the Baruch-Conant-Compton report, by progress in the development of synthetic rubber and by the possibilities in re-claimed rubber, tire companies now await only the "go ahead" signal from Rubber Director Jeffers. They will do much to supply all legitimate civilian re-reading requirements. This re-reading material will be made from re-claimed rubber although 3% may be synthetic. Synthetic rubber will mostly be used for military purposes as it will hold up longer.

The tire industry in general has anticipated the coming new developments. The big three companies have already made re-caps from both synthetic and re-claimed rubber. None of these have yet appeared on the market as their sale has been prohibited. These companies are, however, now all set to go although their productive facilities are jammed in getting out first-class off-size tires in common civilian use, all probability the smaller tire companies, equipped to manufacture the size tires in common civilian use, will profit most from the new setup. This is particularly true in cases of companies whose equipment has not been removed to make way for armament machinery.

Balancing Supply and Demand
While inventories of new casings were abnormally low when tire restrictions were put into effect, stocks on hand have held up pretty well. This is due to an increase in re-reading and the fact that most cars and trucks were carrying pretty good rubber when imports of crude were shut off. When the tire ban was imposed last December only about 7,000,000 of the 27,000,000 passenger cars then in use were eligible for new tires. Existing supplies, due to the efficiency and honesty of ration boards who deserve much credit, have been quite sufficient to take care of vehicles which qualify for new tires.

Normal obsolescence of passenger cars during the past eleven months, plus eastern gasoline restrictions, careful driving, and the limitations on new car sales, have all helped to conserve tires in use and to protect our stock piles. With country-wide gasoline rationing and speeds limited to 35 miles an hour, further savings in rubber will be made. True, there is now building up greater demand for new tires from qualified users. However, when Director Jeffers releases, under the Baruch Plan, sufficient re-claimed rubber to re-tread 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 tires a month for eighteen months it will take only three or four months to balance our tire supply with its legitimate demand.

Synthetic Coming
People speak glibly of synthetic rubber but very few know what it is. Actually, it is a substance known in the trade as Buna S. This is made by combining two other materials, namely, butadiene and styrene. Both of these are derived through chemical processes complicated to the layman. Butadiene can be made from either alcohol or petroleum; hence, the interest of the oil companies and the farmers in synthetic rubber. Behind the alcohol lies grain, molasses, or other products. The plant investment to produce synthetic rubber from alcohol or oil is about the same, nearly \$300 per ton-year capacity. However, as one of the most important items in the process is obtained as a by-product in the manufacture of aviation gasoline, the petroleum method is considered cheaper.

It is taking time to provide new plants and the necessary new materials with which to produce the finished product. In all probability, no synthetic rubber in quantity will be available for the public until early next month. However, for the next five months we shall be able to get along comfortably with re-reading from our re-claimed rubber. But readers can look forward with confidence to the coming of synthetic. In fact, it is more reasonable to expect that our passenger cars and commercial trucks will wear out rather than that a serious shortage of re-reading rubber will curtail our transportation requirements. Also, remember that we may have re-conquered Burma by that time, which would release a lot of native rubber.

What About Rubber Securities?

Copper Chemical Order Eased

Bulletin on Meat, Fish Curing Issued by O.S.C.

Just in time for the fall salmon runs, the big game hunting season, and in advance of farm butchering weather, a new food-for-victory bulletin, "Curing Meats and Fish," has been issued by the extension service at Oregon State College.

The joint authors, A. W. Oliver, associate professor of animal husbandry, and Lucy A. Case, extension nutritionist, point out that the Oregon food-for-victory program is based on making every farm family as nearly self-sufficient as possible with respect to its food supply. This serves a double purpose in providing adequate nutrition for the family under war conditions and also relieving the nation's transportation system of unnecessary burdens. The bulletin is one of a series on the preservation of food for freezing, canning, drying, salting, curing, and storing.

Under methods of curing meats are steps in drying, curing, brining, smoking, and wrapping for storing smoked meat. How to corn beef is explained, as are various methods of curing salmon and smelt.

The bulletin may be obtained free from the county extension office, in Hillsboro.
