Defense Tests Planned Dec. 7

All county defense councils have been asked by the state defense council to arrange for incident tests or drills of the civilian defense corps on December 7, the first anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

December 8, the following day, has been designated as Mobilization day when all citizens not now enrolled in civilian defense will be asked to do so. It is pointed out that there is a job for every man and woman in the organized ranks of those on the home front.

Graduates Observers

Graduates of the War Department Civilian Protection School will be requested to serve as official observers.

Under amended regulations it is no longer mandatory to hold such drills during daylight hours and formal permission from the Office of Civilian Defense to hold incident tests is no longer necessary, provided the state defense council has received not less than ten days' notice of the proposed drill.

The tests on December 7 will not only recall the dastardly attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japs, but will enable defense councils to locate weaknesses in the citizens defense corps which develop only when all units of the corps are called out simultaneously. State Co-ordinator Jerrold Owen said.

There will be no blackout in this district on December 7, according to J. J. McMahon, who has charge of tests, or drills of the civilian defense corps. This district includes Cedar Mill, West Slope, Metzger, Garden Home and Beaverton.

Mr. McMahon wishes to call attention of the people to the dim out ordinance and requests that everyone pull down their blinds else a blackout will be ordered. Some persons have been careful to dim out all lights—but some are getting careless and it is too bad that the district will have to be penalized by a blackout just because of a few careless heedless families.

Proper Endorsement Gas Coupons Save Grief

By properly endorsing their coupons at once, motorists holding gasoline rations will avoid the inconvenience of having to do so when they buy gasoline at a service station. The OPA announces. They will help protect their ration books from possible misuse in the case of loss or theft.

OPA officials urged prompt compliance with the new "write-in" requirements in order to clear up any possible misunderstanding on the part of customers or dealers.

A, B, C and D coupons must be indorsed on the back with the car license number and state of registration. Passenger fleet operators using interchangeable coupon books must write or stamp the fleet name "T" coupons must be indorsed on the back with the war certificate number or the fleet name "E" and "R" coupons must have the name and address of the user written on the back. All indorsements must be in ink to prevent alterations.

Idle Tire Pickup Rush Brings Time Extension

Because Railway Express Agency offices in many places have been unable to cope with a last minute rush of pickup orders from motorists wishing to dispose of idle tires, the Office of Price Administration today announced that the effective date of the order prohibiting use of gasoline by passenger car owners who have more than five tires per car will be postponed from December 1, to December 12.

This action was taken to avoid penalizing motorists who have tried to comply with the tire limitation order but could not because the express company was unable to take care of them.

Six million tires have been turned in thus far under the idle tire purchase plan.

High cow in the herd was Priceless Lord's Rinda 1218589 who in 327 days at 3 years 0 months produced 8,336 lbs. milk, 6.68%, 556.50 lbs. fat. The sire, Brampton Favorite Standard 352493 has 18 daughters figuring in the herd average. Two years herd test have been completed by the Van Kleek Herd.

Do You Possess Book No. 1? If Not, Get Busy

Persons who do not possess war ration book No. 1 must file applications for the coupon book with local ration boards by December 15, the Office of Price Administration said today.

Book No. 1, the familiar sugar rationing coupon booklet, became valid for coffee purchases at midnight November 28. Not only is possession of the book necessary for the purchase of both coffee and sugar, OPA noted, but it will have to be presented to local boards around the first of the year in order to receive war ration book No. 2, the so-called Universal ration book.

The notice was directed at those who have never applied for book No. 1, those who were denied a book because they had an excess sugar supply, and those who surrendered their books for one reason or another.

To prevent fraud, OPA instructed local boards to examine closely persons who claim never to have applied for the book, so that no one shall obtain more than one copy of the ration book.

Only books held by persons 15 years of age or over will be valid, however, for coffee.

Three Different Stamps To Be in Effect

This now makes three different ration stamps available for consumer use. They are as follows:

Stamp No. 9 of Ration Book 1 is good for three pounds of sugar and expires December 15.

Stamp No. 27 of Ration Book 1 is good for one pound of coffee and expires January 3.

Stamps No. 3 of the gasoline rationing A book are good for four gallons each or a total of 32 gallons until January 22.

OPA officials explained that the gas ration book begins with stamp No. 3 in order to synchronize it with the rationing program already in effect in the East. In this way stamps of the same number will be effective at the same time all over the country. The Eastern program began in July and there they have already used coupons numbered 1 and 2.

13th Annual 4-H Club Corn Show Starts

"Growing hybrid corn for seed" will be an added feature of the 13th annual 4-H corn show being held Thursday, Friday, and Saturday in the Commercial-National Bank. This feature will be explained by the use of large placards, made up by Clayton Nyberg of Tualatin, showing how hybrid seed is produced from one and two crosses of known hybrid varieties.

Judging of all corn exhibits will be done Friday by Dr. R. E. Fore of Oregon State College. The exhibits will be open to the public both Friday and Saturday.

4-H members, Future Farmers, and farmers will each have exhibits in separate divisions with ribbons and cash prizes being furnished by the bank.

E. H. Greenwood, Secretary of the Oregon State Bankers association, will be the special speaker at the annual banquet to be held Saturday noon at the Hillsboro Grange Hall. This banquet is for all exhibitors and their families.

Registrants to Carry Classification Cards

Selective service registrants must carry their classification cards with them at all times, beginning January 1, under a new rule issued today. The regulations already require that registration cards be carried.

Upon entering active service, the registrant must surrender his classification card to his commanding officer.

Defense Workers Will Have Holliday

Christmas will be observed as a full holiday in the nation's war production plants, except for necessary maintenance and standby operations. War Production Director Donald M. Nelson announced Friday.

"After the holiday, Nelson said in a statement, "we must drive ahead with renewed energy for the increased production job of 1943—a bigger job than we have ever faced before."

Pointing out that there have been no full holidays in war production this year, Nelson said:

"Now we come to the Christmas holiday. I believe that this day should be the one exception to the rule which has been observed thus far.

"More than ever before in our lives, I suppose, we need this year to pause from our labors on Christmas day and think deeply about the future which we live, in order that from the profound promise of this day we may draw the hope and the vision which we must have."

"On the birthday of the Prince of Peace we should rest from the production of the weapons of war."

Supplemental Mileage Appeal Possible

OPA today explained the procedure by which an applicant for supplemental gasoline mileage may appeal from the action of his local war price and rationing board.

If the applicant feels that he has not been granted the supplemental mileage he needs, he obtains an appeal form from the local board. This is then filled out in duplicate and returned to the board which must act upon the appeal or refer it to the state OPA office for action within five days.

Commercial Vehicles Given First Consideration

With the start of nation-wide mileage rationing war price and ration boards in Oregon were speedily processing thousands of applications for supplemental mileage, the state office of OPA said.

Applications of commercial vehicles are being processed first since these vehicles have only the amount of gasoline in their tanks. Fleet applications get second call for the same reason and third order of preference was applications for C books calling for more than 1000 miles a month.

Persons applying for B books have sufficient gasoline in their A books to last them until all applications may be processed.

Tuesday also began the first period of tire inspection under which every motorist must have his tires inspected before January 31. Hundreds of garages, service stations and tire dealers about Oregon have been designated as official tire inspection stations and there is at least one in every community.

Draft Policy Explained

So much confusion has arisen from the selective service system's recent order barring "essential" workers in aircraft and shipbuilding work from enlisting in the armed forces that Lieutenant-Commander Glenn F. DeGrave, local recruiting officer, Saturday announced the policy which his office is following.

DeGrave stated that the navy is continuing to accept men in 1-A and 3-A draft classifications whether or not they are engaged in war industries. "And we will enlist men if they obtain releases from their employers and draft boards," the commander said.

"This also applies to men who are not yet classified—that is, men 18 or 19 and between 45 and 50 who are working in aircraft or shipbuilding. Men Subject to Draft

"The government's new instructions on the draft," DeGrave continued, "did not constitute a blanket deferment of aircraft and shipbuilding employees. These workers will continue to be called for military service as they are needed and as they can be replaced in essential jobs."

Commander DeGrave re-emphasized the fact that the navy is permitted to enlist men who have received notice of induction from their draft boards.

As to navy recruiting in general he said: "Since we have been placed on a limited quota basis, many persons are under the mistaken impression that they have no chance to get into the navy. The fact is that thus far the limited quotas do not apply to the construction (Seabee) and rigger battalions and the radio technician (RADAR) branches.

"The Seabees, particularly, need a lot of manpower. Men who are physically fit are wanted for petty officer ratings as well as for general construction work. Since the Seabees will expand to an estimated 210,000 it is evident that unlimited enlistments will continue for some time" De Grave declared.

Lock Gas Tank Public Warning

A large number of gasoline thefts is expected by police, now that gasoline rationing is in effect. Police believe that a great number of thefts will be by persons, otherwise law-abiding, who run out of gas on a trip and are unable to buy more. The police warn that the person with an unlocked gas tank is just inviting trouble and suggest that a good lock will be an "excellent investment."

Dim-Out Inspections

When an army officer contacts a local defense council within the restricted light area for the purpose of making a lighting inspection, a lighting consultant should accompany him, if possible. A local law enforcement officer also should accompany the party. Neither the army nor the lighting consultant has any authority to make an arrest. If arrest is indicated, the law enforcement officer should make it and his judgment as to whether or not a violation merits arrest should control. Incidentally, any person in uniform or out who asks to inspect civilian defense council records should be required to produce satisfactory credentials. If he cannot do this, he should be detained and proper authorities immediately notified.
