STUDY IN RELATIVITY

A global war has given all of us a different understanding of relative values of almost everything under the sun.

A year ago we talked glibly about essential and nonessential industries. Guns, ammunition, airplanes and ships were essential. The lowly milk cow, or the hen cackling when she laid an egg, were just part of the country scenery.

But a year later, we have awakened with a start to the fact that milk, butter, eggs, and a thousand-and-one other products that seemed relatively unimportant compared to battle equipment, are today the indispensable things that keep our armies and our fleets in fighting trim—not only our own but our Allies.

Millions of people found when preparing Christmas packages that candy—one of the articles that we have taken for granted like air and water—was hard to get or unobtainable in many cases. And why? Because it was being sent literally by the shipload to all parts of the world, for our armed forces. The Army nutrition experts find the American soldier is a better fighting man when candy is part of his diet. It is one of the things that soldiers buy most in railroad stations and camps. It goes into the mountains,

jungles and deserts in many forms as an Army field ration. Here is a story of relativity. When the war started, who ever thought of a package of candy in relation to a rifle, a cannon, a jungle uniform, or a rubber boat? In twelve months, our sense of values has indeed changed. From now on, the wise man will be cautious in classifying essential and non-essential enterprises.

OSC Army Reservists to Be Called up in March

Oregon State College, Feb. 12—The recently announced decision to call students of the army enlisted reserve corps into active training at the end of the winter term will affect several hundred Oregon State college men, although the exemptions being allowed assure a more nearly normal spring term than was expected at first, says E. B. Lemon, registrar.

Approximately 435 students here are in the army enlisted reserve corps, but of these about 145 are juniors in the advanced ROTC work, who are to be left until the end of the year under latest rulings. A considerable number of the remainder are sophomores in engineering, science, or pre-medical courses, who also are to remain at least till June. Those in the air corps reserve, numbering 121, are not to be called until present crowded training facilities are cleared.

The remainder, probably numbering around 200 or so, will enter basic training probably late in March, and, after 13 weeks, will be eligible for assignment to continue college training in uniform, though it is not expected that all present student army reservists will be re-assigned to college. No date has been set for calling the naval student reservists for preliminary training to precede the reassignment to college.

Contrary to earlier reports, students who enter college prior to completion of their high school work will not be eligible to join the V-1 navy reserve program until after their high school diploma is obtained. Furthermore, there is no assurance that enlistments in this program will be accepted after March 15.

"England Wins War" Is Holland Headline

San Francisco, Feb. 12—Meekly obeying orders of German authorities to publish excerpts of a recent Churchill speech and then to ridicule it with sarcastic comment, it was revealed here today, by the Netherland Information Bureau, the editor of a Dutch newspaper Het Vaderland printed his story with a screaming headline England Wins the War—and in fine print—Says Churchill. For this, the editor was fined 25,000 guilders by the Nazis, about \$12,500.

The Valley of the Shadow

Every hour of every day all over this world, on land, sea and in the air, the finest and best of our youth are passing through the valley of the shadow.

When they are sent into danger, it is not asked of them from what class or from what national or racial stock they come, or by what religious creed they live. The phrase Selective Service does not mean selection by these discriminative canons. Instead, it means that they are chosen for their physical fitness and their mental ability to endure hardship, strain, stress and privation, to obey and carry out orders, to follow and to lead—in short, that they have the resiliency and high courage of youth.

So our boys go into the valley of the shadow. Some will come out—not unchanged, for who that faces death bravely, fears death? Many will never return. Differing though they may in class, color or creed, they will lie alike in distant graves, in land honored forever by the fact that they died that other men might be free.

Three such boys died in the line of duty a short time ago—a Protestant named Vogel, a Catholic named Sipowsky and a Jew named Goldberg. There is room for editorialists galore in that statement. But more significant to me than any editorial was a phrase in the government story—"Three American boys in the Navy, united by their common faith in American democracy and in freedom, met death together."

They met death, as brave men meet the thing they fear. United by their common faith in American democracy and in freedom, they walked into the valley of the shadow never to return.

Our hearts go out to those they left behind them, those who too, go through the shadows of separation. But to them is one consolation they share in common. Though these lads followed different leads of faith—to each was vouchsafed the promise of the Psalmist David: "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for Thou art with me. Thy rod and Thy staff, they comfort me." And each family who mourns rests secure in the faith that beyond the valley of the shadow lies an eternal peace.

What I myself saw in my four years in Europe gave me a new realization of the priceless rights which we here enjoy.

No secret police can in the night whisk us away, never again to be seen by those we love.

None of us can be deprived by any party, state or tyrant of those precious civil liberties which our laws and our courts guarantee.

None of us can be persecuted for practicing the faith which we found at our mother's knee. None of us can be persecuted, tortured or killed because of the fact that an accident of fate might have made us of the same race as the Nazarene.

No American can be placed by any party or government in a regimented vise which takes from him or her either freedom of economic opportunity or political religious liberty.

What would the millions of unfortunate men, women and children in Europe give to be able to live and enjoy such a way of life?

Well, in this war, those are the things in our lives which are in jeopardy. Our boys are dying to preserve them for us.

Then we can do no less than to "say yes" and fill those war stamp albums. It is our duty and privilege to help the secretary of the treasury, Mr. Morgenthau, in his magnificent effort to do the tremendous job of getting the money to keep our boys supplied with the weapons with which to fight our fight.

Surely that is little enough for us to do on the home front.

How is it that Dr. Martin Niemöller is able to stand out against Hitler in the rags, vermin and starvation of the concentration camp? This man who dared to speak for God—How? Because Niemöller gave the Holy Spirit every room in his heart. He is making it through by POWER FROM ON HIGH.

And you? Do you run with the world? Are you saved but fruitless? If you have Christ as Savior, the Holy Spirit INDWELLS YOU. But he waits to INFILL you. He wants every room. Are you the restless joyless Christian? Or are you possessed of the peace that passeth all understanding. Die to self; be INFILLED with the Spirit and make it through by POWER FROM ON HIGH.

RATION BOOK REMINDER

SUGAR—Stamp No. 11, in Book 1, good for three pounds, expires March 15.

GASOLINE—Stamps No. 4, each good for four gallons through March 21.

REGISTRATION DATES—Fuel oil dealers, Feb. 13 and 13. Fuel oil users Feb. 15 to 17. Ration book No. 2, Feb. 22 to 27.

COFFEE—February 8 to March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1, book holders 15 years of age or over, good until midnight March 21 for 1 pound of coffee.

TIRES—Cars with B and C mileage rationing books must have tires inspected prior to February 23.

All C coupon books and most B cards must be renewed March 1.

Cars with A books must have tires inspected prior to February 23.

SHOES—February 9 to June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
February 20—Retail sales of canned fruit and vegetables ends at midnight.

February 22 to 27—Registration for war ration book No. 2 at schools or ration boards.

March 1—Rationing of canned and dried fruits, canned and frozen vegetables begins.

War Stamp Sales Over Half Billion Dollars, Album Drive Opens



Appealing Margaret C. Russell of the War Savings Staff takes up this new Treasury poster which will be seen from coast to coast. It pictures retailers' slogan, "SAY YES." A drive is underway for Americans to buy additional War Stamps to fill albums and convert them into War Bonds.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The nation's retailers from the tiniest hamlets to the mighty cities are acting as a spearhead in a great Treasury Department campaign to sell the additional War Savings Stamps needed to fill more than 100,000,000 albums now in the hands of the American people.

According to a report released by the Treasury Department today, sales of War Savings Stamps totaled \$559,777,000 for the period from May 1, 1941, through November, 1942.

Stamp sales have risen from less than three million dollars per month when they were first introduced to the public to an average of more than fifty million dollars per month at the present time.

The Treasury's slogan, "A half-

filled album is like a half-equipped soldier," has been adopted officially by retailers for the campaign.

The importance of the drive is seen in the fact that a War Bond potential of nearly two billion dollars hangs in the balance.

Every War Stamp album, converted into a People's Bond, for which the purchaser pays \$18.75 and which matures to \$25.00 value when held for 10 years, adds its force to the war effort.

The Treasury Department is counting upon the country's school children to play a powerful role in the success of the SAY YES drive. The volume of stamp and bond sales at the rate of \$200,000,000 for the current school year.
