State's 4-H Clothing Girls Emulate WAACS, WAVES to Help Win War

Legions of 4-H Clothing club girls in Oregon and other states, whose age makes them ineligible to become WAACS, WAVES, or SPARS, are determined to emulate those organizations by performing war tasks that will release other members of their family for various essential duties.

With that purpose in mind, many of the girls have enrolled in the current National 4-H Clothing activity, the primary objective of which is to contribute to the nation's 1943 Victory program through the construction, repair, and conservation of clothing for their entire family. They also are encouraged to serve organizations in their communities that are conducting civilian or military clothing activities.

As incentives to develop initiative that will enable the girls to use to the best advantage all available clothing material, special awards for outstanding records of achievement are provided by the Spool Cotton Company's Educational Bureau. These awards include medals to county winners, an all-expense trip to the National 4-H club Congress in Chicago to each state's champion, and twelve college scholarships of \$200 each to the national winners.

The activity will be conducted, along with other 4-H wartime projects of production and conservation, under the direction of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, State Agricultural Colleges and County Extension Agents.

Teachers Cause More Concern Than Salaries

Finding teachers more than meeting the minimum salary law of \$1200 promises to be the problem for district schools, according to forecast from the office of the county school superintendent. Some difficulty was experienced at the beginning of the present school year in filling positions open in the county. With a number of teachers expected to join military auxiliary groups such as the WAACS and WAVES, the shortage probably will be increased next year. The combination of higher salaries and teacher shortage is expected to bring about some consolidations although there have been no official reports of moves in this direction come to the superintendent's office.
