RATION BOOK REMINDER

CEILING PRICES

May 10—Community-wide ceiling
prices on a substantial number of
grocery products will be effective
Monday. They will cover poultry,
fluid milk, sugar, cereals, evaporated
and condensed milk, flour and a
number of other grocery items.

MEAT CEILING PRICES

May 17—New starting date for dol-
lar-and-cents retail ceiling prices on
beef, veal, mutton and lamb. This
date was postponed from April 15.

RATION BOOK NO. 3

May 20—New book No. 3 to be is-
sued as replacement for books No. 1
and No. 2 when needed, on basis of
mailed applications. Applications
will be distributed by mail carriers
beginning May 20.

RED STAMPS

(For meat products, canned fish,

most edible oils and cheese)
Red Stamp E, valid April 25, re-
mains valid through May.

Red Stamp F, becomes valid May 2.
Red stamp G becomes valid May 9.
Revised point values are effective
May 2.

Retailers must register with local
boards and receive allowable inven-
tories of meats and fats May 3-14.

BLUE STAMPS

(For canned, frozen, and certain
dehydrated foods)
Blue stamps G. H. J. remain valid
through May.

SUGAR

Stamp No. 12 in war ration book
one is valid for 5 pounds of sugar
through May 31.

COFFEE

April 26 to May 30—Stamp No. 23
good for one pound, for bookholders
15 years of age or over, in book 1.

May 17—New starting date for dol-
lar-and-cents retail ceiling prices on

give OPA a chance to reexamine pre-
viously ordered ceiling prices with a
view to reducing them from 1 to 10
cents a pound.

Forest Protection Needs
Government Assistance
Thru Emergency Funds

Forest protective organizations
and timberland owners in the Pac-
ific Northwest face the prospect of
the most dangerous and hazardous
forest fires in history without
benefit of federal emergency funds
such as were used to such good ad-
vantage last year. A \$6,500,000 em-
ergency fund has been cut from the
special deficiency appropriation bud-
get.

Leaders in both Oregon and Wash-
ington forest industries circles, state
officials and fire protection associa-
tion wardens are bringing terrific
pressure on western congressmen to
get the emergency forest fire fight-
ing funds reinstated and are asking
the general public's support.

"Our need is greater than ever and
the possibility of sabotage of our for-
est zone of this war," said Orville
Miller, president of the West Coast
Lumbermen's association. "The ex-
tra help must come from Congress to
increase the effectiveness of our forest
fire fighting organizations by
adding extra men to meet enemy at-
tacks against our forests."

"Private operators this year have
contributed \$48,255 for fire protec-
tion through state controlled associa-
tions, the state has put up another
\$377,907, and private timber land
owners in addition will spend this
year an additional \$1,117,600, State
Forester Rogers pointed out. "State
and private operators have done all
they can. This added money we
want is for preventative measures to
meet the ever-present damages and
hazards caused by the war. This is
a national responsibility and must be
borne by the federal government."

"It is unthinkable that Congress
should fail to at least provide the
appropriations necessary to protect
the forests of the United States dur-
ing this combination of emergency
conditions," said Colonel W. B. Gree-
ley, manager of the West Coast Lum-
bermen's association. "This war is
a hazard that affects the Pacific
Coast more than any other area of
the United States. We are extreme-
ly vulnerable to attack from the sea
—twice last year abortive attempts
were made to set fire to our forests
by enemy planes from submarines.
We have the largest areas of inflam-
mable coniferous forests running right
down to the water's edge. The pos-
sibilities are frightful unless we get
this money for adequate prevention
and protection of our critically need-
ed forests."

Senator Rufus Holman will take
the lead, it is understood, in the fight
which apparently will be necessary to
get this emergency appropriation
acted upon favorably. Forest lead-
ers urge that citizens of the North-

west write their representatives and
tell them of the great need for the
protection of the forest lands of the
Northwest from which more than
one-third of all government's needs
for lumber for war is coming.

Red Cross Sponsoring
Swimming Program

Washington County Red Cross
chapter will carry on an intensive
functional swimming and water safety
training program for young men
and women of induction and pre-in-
duction age.

The course is similar to that insti-
tuted in the nation's training camps
by the American Red Cross more
than a year ago, Bob Lischefsky, as-
sistant water safety director for
Washington county, said.

Functional and water safety is
stripped of frills, Lischefsky ex-
plained. Strokes like the crawl, de-
signed for speed, and similar popular
strokes of peacetime, are impractical
in wartime, when the swimmer must
be able to keep afloat with little ef-
fort and for long periods.

Functional swimming teaches a
man how to leave a sinking ship,
how to enter the water, what to do
if the water surface is covered with
burning oil and what simple devices
such as a shirt or a pair of
trousers . . . can be used as life
buoys.

Approaching enemy held positions
by crossing rivers means that the
men must know how to swim, how to
carry his weapon and equipment
above water and how to move silently
in water, and more, is just what
the Red Cross functional swimming
and water safety course is prepared
to teach, he concluded.

Anyone interested in the water
safety course to be offered June 14
to June 26 at the Pacific university
pool in Forest Grove with a nation-
ally trained American Red Cross in-
structor, may sign for the course at
Red Cross headquarters in the Hill
theatre building, Hillsboro. Appli-
cants will be taken from eight to 80
years for beginners and other cour-
ses.
