Beaverton High Commencement Set For Thursday

Graduation week will begin at Beaverton high school when Reverend Willard E. Hall, pastor of Bethel Congregational church, will address the graduates at the customary baccalaureate service Sunday, May 23, at 8 p. m. in the high school gymnasium. Presentation of diplomas by W. D. Cameron, school board chairman, will follow on Thursday evening, May 27.

Commencement this year consists of a patriotic pageant in which the graduates review their high school activities since their entrance in 1939. Special emphasis will be placed upon the war projects of the students. A mixed chorus of seniors will sing several selections. Alaska Territory, Apr. 30, 1943

Dear Mrs. Gilham:

I have been putting off writing this letter but then I have been very busy as since I was drafted and sent to Presidio of Monterey and then to my training camp at Albany, Calif., and then sent overseas so have spent 8 months out of my first year in foreign service, and I am taking this chance to thank the folks of Beaverton for the sewing kit as it sure has come in handy and for the big send off that they gave us fellows who were leaving.

All that I can tell about this place is that we are under strict blackout and if we get all of our Christmas cards by Easter we consider them up to date, and that beer and girls are something we dream of but never have as everything here is G. I. as there isn't any natives here, and writing about our activities is strictly censored, and all of us fellows here have been greatly surprised at this country and especially the weather. I am the only one here in the outfit that is from Oregon.

I will take this chance to say Hello to all my friends in Beaverton and West Slope.

I will say this to all the new draftees that basic training may seem tough but there are a lot of things that are tougher. With that thought I will close.

County Budget Group Appointed by Court

H. L. MacKenzie of Hillsboro, Vernon Burlingham of Forest Grove, and Leonard Adams of Beaverton have been named on the county budget committee and will serve with Judge H. D. Kerkman and Commissioners James Lewis and J. W. Hughes in working out the 1943-44 county budget.

Oregon Bond Buying Total \$153,668,792

Oregon's second war loan total continues to climb, the state war finance committee revealed as additional reports advanced the state's purchases of government bonds to \$153,668,792. The original goal was \$100,000,000.

Purchases by others than banks climbed to \$66,923,792, or far above the goal of \$49,000,000.

Officers of the finance committee cautioned however, that the state's high record should not be taken for a signal by the public to let down its buying. Vastly greater sums still are needed for victory, they said.

Two Beaverton High Students Receive OSC Education Scholarship

Oregon State College, Corvallis, May 21—Two Beaverton high school students were among 69 high school students in Oregon to receive Oregon State board of higher education scholarships to attend Oregon State college this fall.

Margery Graf of route 5, Portland, and Patricia Mitchell of Aloha, were highly recommended by I. R. Metzler, principal of the Beaverton high school, and received the two scholarships.

Miss Graf did not state a definite course of study for college but designated some branch of science for her major field. In high school she was a member of Torch honor society student council, Girl Reserve, glee club, Girl Reserve band, and annual staff. She was editor of the Hummer. Miss Graf's scholastic rating placed her in the upper 8 per cent of her class.

Chemistry will be the major field of Miss Mitchell. She lists Torch honor society, Girl Reserves, Glee club, annual staff, and a talent show as her high school activities. Miss Mitchell placed scholastically in the upper 7 per cent of her class.

Poppy Day Slated May 29 in Beaverton

Poppies in tribute to America's battle dead of two wars will be worn in Beaverton on Saturday, May 29, 1943. President of Beaverton Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary announced today.

The poppies this year will honor the men who have given their lives in the present conflict, as well as those who fell among the poppies of France and Belgium 25 years ago, she said. Money will be used for welfare of victims of both wars and their families.

The little red flowers of remembrance will be available to everyone in the city, offered by volunteer workers under leadership of Opal Eisenhauer and Mary Unger.

New Oregon Motor Vehicle Law Effective June 9

Failure to comply will result in loss of driver's license and car plates.

The new law is popular with the majority of car owners, because it affords them the same protection that they are required to furnish others.
