GEN. WM. MOULTRIE
DEFENDER OF CHARLESTON 1776



SGT. WILLIAM JASPER, OUTSTANDING HERO IN THE WAR FOR AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE, DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF UNDER GEN. MOULTRIE AT FORT SULLIVAN, CHARLESTON (S.C.) HARBOR, JUNE 28, 1776, WHEN HE RECOVERED THE STATE FLAG AND, IN THE FACE OF DEADLY FIRE, ATTACHED IT TO A



SPONGE STAFF AND REMOUNTED IT ON THE RAMPARTS. THE ENEMY WAS DRIVEN OFF. FOR HIS BRAVERY, JASPER WAS PRESENTED WITH A SWORD BY GOV. RUTLEDGE OF SO. CAROLINA, BUT DECLINED A COMMISSION. HE WAS KILLED AT SAVANNAH 1779.

RATION BOOK REMINDER

RATION BOOK NO. 3
May 20—New book No. 3 to be issued as replacement for books No. 1 and No. 2 when needed, on basis of mailed applications. Applications will be distributed by mail carriers beginning May 20.

RED STAMPS
(For meat products, canned fish, most edible oils and cheese)
Red Stamp E, valid April 25, remains valid through May.

Red Stamp F, becomes valid May 2.
Red Stamp G becomes valid May 9.
Revised point values are effective May 2.

Retailers must register with local boards and receive allowable inventories of meats and fats May 3-4.

BLUE STAMPS
(For canned, frozen, and certain dehydrated foods)
Blue stamps G. H. J., remain valid through May.

SUGAR
Stamp No. 12 in war ration book one is valid for 5 pounds of sugar through May 31.

COFFEE
April 26 to May 30—Stamp No. 23 good for one pound, for bookholders 15 years of age or over, in book 1.

MEAT CEILING PRICES
May 17—New starting date for dollar-and-cents retail ceiling prices on beef, veal, mutton and lamb. This date was postponed from April 15 to give OPA a chance to reexamine previously ordered ceiling prices with a view to reducing them from 1 to 10 cents a pound.

A GASOLINE BOOKS
May 21—Expiration date stamps No. 5 in A book (four gallons each).

C TIRE INSPECTION
May 31—Final tire inspection date for cars with C mileage books.

B TIRE INSPECTION
June 30—Final tire inspection date for cars with B mileage books.

A TIRE INSPECTION
September 30—First inspection for A bookholders must have been made by March 31; subsequent inspection within every six-month period thereafter, but at least 90 days apart. September 30 is next tire inspection deadline for A books.

SHOES
June 15—Expiration date stamp No. 17, book No. 1 (one pair shoes). Families may pool stamps.

TRANSPORT CERTIFICATES
June 30—Final date for filing transport mileage ration certificates (T-1 and T-2) for third quarter of 1943.

The current sugar ration will remain unchanged in the next rationing period beginning June 1, the

Office of Price Administration announced today.

Sugar stamp No. 13 in ration book No. 1 will become valid June 1, and will be good for five pounds of sugar through August 15. This maintains the current ration of five pounds of sugar for a period of 2 1/2 months. Stamp No. 12 expires May 31.

The OPA said it made the announcement of the next ration to enable the sugar trade to plan its operations well in advance, and thus make the best use of plant, labor and transportation facilities.

Since the home-canning rules permit a maximum of 25 pounds per person, home canners may apply to local ration boards for an extra 15 pounds per person in addition to the ten pounds to be obtained from book No. 1 coupons.

The new plan was adopted, it was

understood, because most ration boards grant up to ten pounds of canning sugar for the mere asking. The coupon system is expected to simplify the handling of applications without, officials estimated any appreciable difference in the amount of sugar obtained.
