RATION BOOK REMINDER

RATION BOOK NO. 3
Application for ration book No. 3
are now being distributed by mail
carriers. The application is to be
returned by June 10. Postmen are to
distribute book No. 3 about July 15.
Book No. 3 will be a replacement
when needed, for books No. 1 and
No. 2.

**RATION BOOK NO. 2
RED STAMPS**
May 30—Red Stamp K (meats-fats)
in book No. 2 becomes valid; good
thru June 30. Unused red stamps
E, F, G, H, remain valid through
May. Red stamp J valid May 23;
Red stamp L valid June 6, M on June
13; N on June 20; all expire June 30.
Each weekly series good for 16 points

BLUE STAMPS
June 7—Newly set expiration date
for blue stamps G, H, and J (pro-
cessed foods) in book No. 2 (Replaces
former May 31 expiration date.)
May 24—Blue stamps K, L and M
(processed foods in book No. 2 be-
come valid. These stamps totaling
48 points, good through July 7.

SUGAR
June 1—Stamp 13, book No. 1 val-
id for purchase of five pounds. Ex-
pires midnight, August 15.
May 24—Stamps No. 15, 16 in book
No. 1 each good for five pounds of
sugar for home canning; good thru
October 31.

COFFEE
May 30—Stamp No. 23, book No. 1,
good for one pound, expires at mid-
night.

FUEL OIL
September 30—Period 5 coupons
valid March 26 thru September 30.
Heating coupons—one unit, value 10
gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.

GASOLINE
July 21—Expiration date for stamps
No. 6, A book, which became valid
May 22 (Each stamp good for 4 gal.)
May 31—Many B and C mileage ra-
tion books expire. (Check expira-
tion date appearing on book and ap-
ply early for renewal. Application
blanks available at service stations
and ration boards).

C TIRE INSPECTION
May 31—Final tire inspection date
for cars with C mileage books.

B TIRE INSPECTION
June 30—Final tire inspection date
for cars with B mileage books.

A TIRE INSPECTION
September 30—First inspection for
A bookholders must have been made
by March 31; subsequent inspection
within every six-month period there-
after, but at least 90 days apart.
September 30 is next tire inspection
deadline for A books.

SHOES
June 15—Expiration date stamp No.
17, book No. 1 (one pair shoes). Fam-
ilies may pool stamps.

TRANSPORT CERTIFICATES
June 30—Final date for filing
transport mileage ration certificates
(T-1 and T-2) for third quarter of
1943.

Hello Folks:

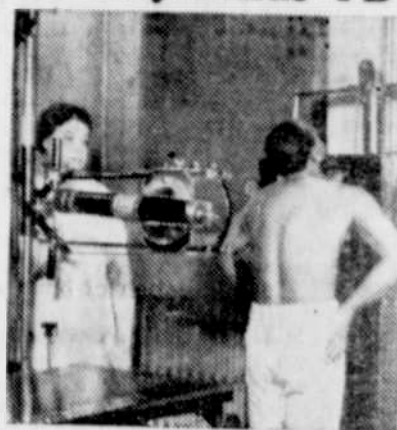
Well, I waked up the other mornin'
