WEAK IN HISTORY

Most of us oldsters can be caught napping if questioned about elementary phases of early American history, using as an excuse that it has been long since we were in school. But how can you account for the college freshmen who know little of the vitally important facts dealing with this country's development? It isn't that the 7,000 students answering the questionnaire in the thirty-six universities, in their survey, didn't know lots of dates of obscure historical events or national matters of not much importance to the country's growth, BUT 26 per cent of them didn't know that Woodrow Wilson was president during the First World War, 21 per cent didn't know that Lincoln was president during the Civil War and only 84 per cent failed to list two things that could be connected with Thomas Jefferson as his contributions to our history books. Does this point to a startling amount of ignorance of American college students in an important subject? Don't think that the students who answered these questions had not previously studied American history, government, social subjects in high school, because they had. Few of them had taken it in college, this course in American history. Geographically the survey showed the students, in many cases, were "off the beam," as they placed Portland, Oregon, on water such as Hudson River, the Great Lakes, and the Atlantic Ocean. Illinois, California, Texas and North Dakota were even named as Eastern seaboard states! With all of the stress laid today on our fight to preserve freedom of speech, assembly, religion and of the press, you would think they all could list the four points of the Bill of Rights. Last June the New York Times made a survey and found that 82 per cent of the nation's colleges didn't require American History for the college graduates. Students had taken this as a high school course and it was below the level of college subjects. The recent survey shows that somebody had better start to stress the importance of requiring a concise, intelligent, interesting course to further interest in KNOWING AMERICA.

THE FARMER'S WIFE

HOW DO YOU LIKE THIS?

Southwest farmers, hiring laborers imported from Mexico, have even been told by the Farm Security Administration what to feed them. According to the FSA instructions, butter is to be served at each meal. Bacon squares or meat in some form for breakfast six times per week and ham one time per week. Eggs should be served every morning, and no limit placed on the number consumed. Always give sweet potatoes at dinner and supper when they are reasonable since the Mexicans like them. Serve cooked cereals only not corn flakes. Usually try to have only corn bread at dinner; biscuits and white bread at supper; sometimes white bread is required at dinner and supper as well. In the summer iced tea or root beer should be served.

This is the first time, to our knowledge, the United States Government has told the farmer's wife what to cook.

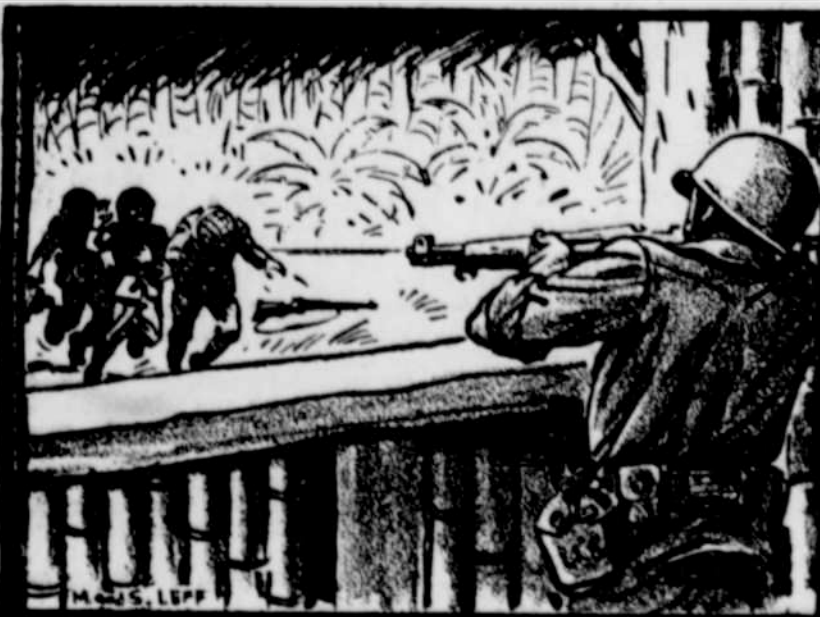
Civilian Defense Radio Program Starts June 26

The new Civilian Defense Radio program will make its debut June 26. Each Saturday between June 26 and September 18 at 2 p. m., a half hour program entitled "If They Come Tonight," will be broadcast over the NBC Network via KGW. At the conclusion of each program James M. Landis, Director of the Office of Civilian Defense, Washington, D. C., will award a citation to a Civilian Defense Worker somewhere in the United States. The person receiving the citation will be switched into the program from his home city and will be interviewed by the local announcer.

are willing to take it for the same price. Hold at least 30% of your normal business, independent of the Government or war. Have in permanent stock only commodities which will be needed after the war. Many government contracts with concerns on the Atlantic Seaboard will be cancelled when an armistice is declared with Japan also.

Avoid Debt

As far as possible these war-time conditions should be used for getting out of debt. The theory that it is good to go into a period of inflation with a large debt is wrong. Wise businessmen will make little or no capital expansions at the present time. The conditions facing us after the war will be so very different than that they are today, we should enter them with large cash reserves and no debts.

It is unwise now to speculate in raw materials or manufactured goods. There is no telling what prices will be after the war. The prices for some commodities will then go up; while the prices for other commodities will go down. It is bad enough to have any slow moving items on hand when peace comes, but by all means avoid unnecessary commitments.

Insure Accounts Receivable

In addition to providing yourself with sufficient working capital and guarding against inventory losses, it is well carefully to watch receivables. If possible, keep these down to a 30-day basis. Even though you are careful yourself in providing for post-war reserves, many of your customers will not be so careful. Hence, when the Government and sub-contractors cancel their contracts, the latter may be unable to pay you what they owe you. Thus, it is well to insure certain accounts receivable.

Companies having outstanding cumulative preferred stocks should try to retire such issues. This would be in addition to eliminating bond issues and bank loans. It is also wise to set up a sinking fund of 1% of the net sales from now on to provide for losses on any receivables which are not properly insured. By all means do not "grab" for new war business at the present time.

What About Salaries?

The salary situation is now pretty well frozen so that it is very difficult to raise salaries even if desirable. Cases that are worthy of increases should be handled by bonuses to avoid unpleasant readjustments after this war is over. Salesmen can be kept on a sliding scale, but this should be based on profits rather than volume. Although the temptation today is to keep all employees, yet there are some who could now wisely be let go to their advantage as well as yours.

Farm Youth of U. S. Looks to Tomorrow

TOMORROW'S farmers and farm homemakers are second to no school group in their enthusiasm for investing in War Bonds and Stamps to make sure their future is secure. Through the Schools At War program they are investing what they save and earn in War Stamps and Bonds.

First evidence of this is the amount the 4-H Club boys and girls and the FFA boys invested in war savings in 1942 from "Victory Pig" and other projects. A million and a half 4-H Club members put \$6,000,000 of their own savings in War Bonds and Stamps and sold \$2,500,000 worth of War Savings to their neighbors. Nearly a quarter million members of Future Farmers of America invested more than \$1,500,000.

Spurred by the realization that the financial welfare of farm families the next 20 years depends on how wisely they use today's higher incomes from increased food and other wartime production, both groups have set their goals still higher for 1943.

These farm youths are building financial reserves, and urging their parents to do the same, for after-the-war necessities, to meet financial emergencies and to help them get started in college.

They're building reserves today for tomorrow's farm buildings and for the other things they will need when they're tomorrow's farmers and homemakers.
