RATION BOOK REMINDER

COFFEE—Stamp No. 21 valid from July 1 to 21. Stamp No. 22 valid from July 22 to August 11.

SUGAR—Stamps 15 and 16 in war ration book one valid for 5 lbs of sugar each for home canning, good until Oct. 31.

Housewives may apply at local boards for supplemental home canning rations, if essential.

RED STAMPS

June 27—Red stamp P valid; stamp Q valid July 4; R on July 11; S on July 18. All expire July 31. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

BLUE STAMPS

July 7—Expiration date blue stamps K, L and M in ration book No. 2 (processed fruits and vegetables) Blue stamps N, P and Q valid from July 1 to August 7.

RATION BOOK NO. 3

Initial registration for war ration book No. 3 closed on June 10 and will not be resumed until August 1. OPA announced that postmen are to deliver book No. 3 before July 21 to all who filed proper applications. This book is to be a replacement, when needed, for books No. 1 and 2.

TIRE INSPECTION

Sept. 30 is next tire inspection deadline for A books.

FUEL OIL

Period 5 coupons valid to September 30.

GASOLINE

Stamp No. 6 in A books valid thru July 21 for four gallons each. Extra gasoline available for driving to suburban Victory gardens.

TIRES

Motorists entitled to over 240 miles per month gasoline rations are eligible for grade 1 or grade 2 tires.

B TIRE INSPECTION

June 30—Final tire inspection date for cars with B mileage books.

TIRE INSPECTION

C card autos by May 31, B cards by June 30 and A cards by September 30.

A TIRE INSPECTION

A bookholders must have been made by March 31; subsequent inspection within every six-month period thereafter, but at least 90 days apart. September 30 is next tire inspection deadline for A books.

SHOES

June 16—Stamp No. 18, book No. 1, valid for one pair of shoes through October 31. Stamps interchangeable among family living in same household.

Shades of WPA

In Washington D. C., the Government last year spent \$115,000 to build an asphalt-paved deluxe parking lot for the Army and Navy on a grassy polo field near the Lincoln Memorial. Now some \$25,000 more is being spent too tear it up—after several months during which the lot averaged about a dozen cars per day in spaces for several thousand; but still the Army and Navy will not release it for badly-needed housing for WAVES. It must revert to a recreational area, officials insist.

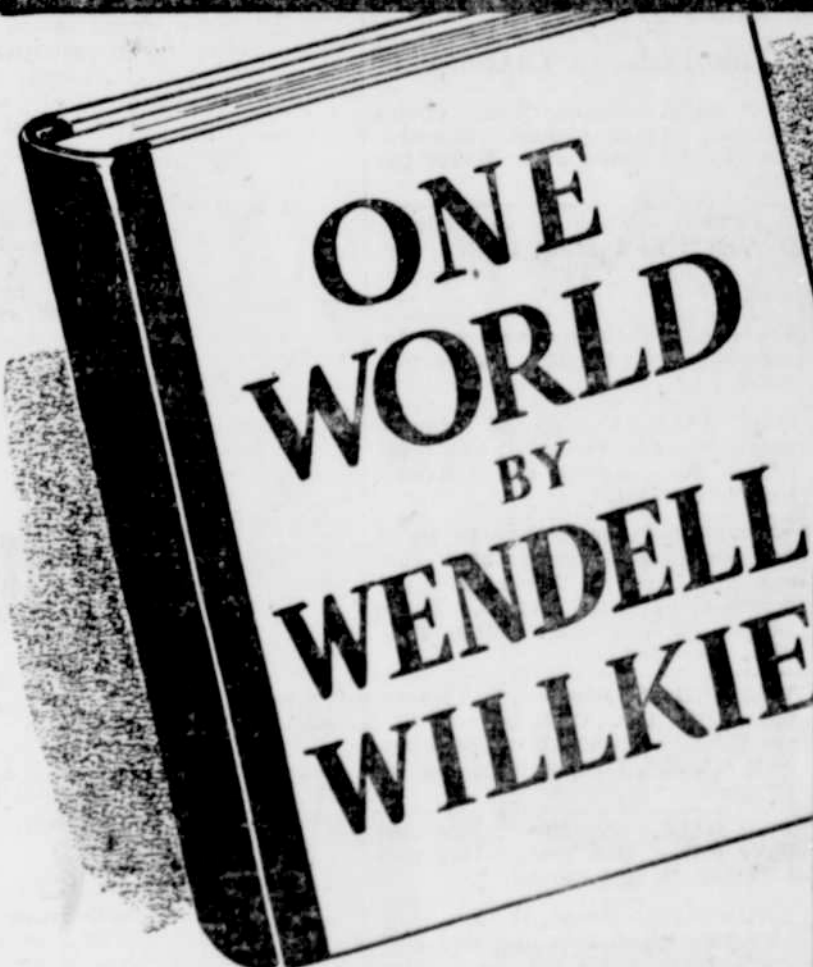
