Ration Books To Be Called

All old-type B and C gasoline ra-
tion books will be called in for re-
issuance shortly, an office of price
administration spokesman said Sat-
urday night, and motorists will be re-
quired after Sept. 1 to use a new
style of coupons.

The action is to halt the use of in-
valid coupons from expired books,
and to nullify any counterfeit cou-
pons which may be in circulation.

Each stamp in the new books reads
"mileage ration B (or C). The old
coupons read: "Permits delivery of
one B (or C) unit of gasoline at
time of sale. Office of price adm."

Persons having old-style books may
surrender them in person or by mail
to local ration boards for exchange
on or after August 23, the spokesman
said. Expiration dates and the
number of stamps will remain the same.

Gresham, August 20—After almost
a year of dormancy, the building-
studied Multnomah county fair are
springing to life in preparation for
the opening of the 37th annual Victo-
ry exposition Monday.

Workers have been busy spreading
sawdust shavings in all of the barns,
making stalls ready for hundreds of
animals, and getting the race track
in shape for Monday afternoon's
opening race program.

War-time features scheduled along
with other traditional county fair at-
tractions include civilian defense de-
monstrations, a blood donor center
operated by the Portland chapter of
the American Red Cross, a shipbuild-
ers' welding contest for the cham-
pionship of Portland war industries
and scores of educational booths ar-
ranged by government agencies.

The second annual Western Stamp-
pede will be held Sunday afternoon,
August 29, during which time West-
ern riding groups from Multnomah,
Clackamas and Washington counties
will be in competition for trophies
and other awards.

As usual on the opening day of the
fair, hundreds of Willamette Valley
school children will have their time
for fun. Feature of this "Children's
Day" event will be a get-together of
the youngsters in the grandstand at
1 p. m. under direction of Multnomah
county Superintendent of Schools
Roy E. Cannon. There will be novel-
ty races, crawls, and contests for
boys and girls of all ages. School
youngsters will be admitted to the
fairgrounds free.

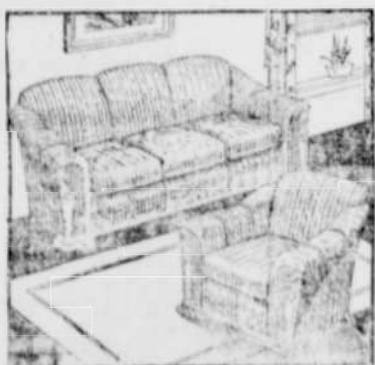

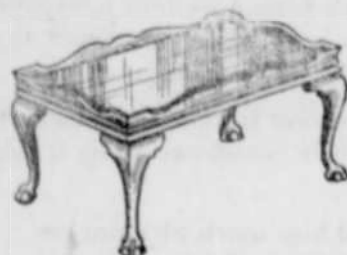

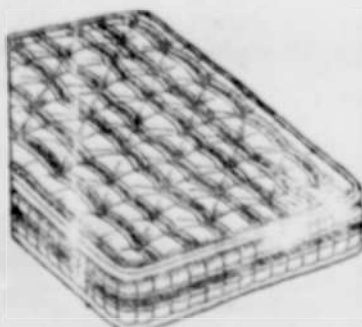
