#### THE TIME FOR ACTION

This is the time of the year that suffers from hay fever and asthma unite in a fervent wish that the authorities that be will get busy and cut down ragweed and other growths which cause them to suffer.

Undoubtedly this community includes some of its citizens in the amazing number of those who suffer from these diseases. If something like the "good neighbor" policy could be put into effect in this community, many weeds would come down and these sufferers would be spared a part, at least, of their annual affliction.

Municipal authorities everywhere should take cognizance of the situation and do what is possible to prevent the prevalence of ragweed and such growths.

#### FIRST THINGS FIRST

There is a growing awareness today, among people of all occupations, of the necessity to preserve the American system of freedom of enterprise, if democracy is to survive after the war. More and more, as business undergoes the necessary wartime restriction, Americans are coming to understand that the prime requisites for postwar reconstruction is the lifting of these restrictions when the need for them is ended.

#### Don't Take Whole Pound of Flesh

Everyone knows that this nation must collect taxes—heavier taxes than any individual ever dreamed of. But an increasing number of public officials are awakening to the fact that the tax load on business can be made so heavy that it will actually kill that source of tax revenue, and in so doing destroy the jobs which the wages and salaries that, in turn, pay the billions in personal income taxes.

Congress will receive legislation to create a special government agency to make loans to private business concerns and provide other types of financial assistance to industry. The new measure will be sponsored by the special Senate Committee on Small Business headed by Senator James E. Murray of Montana, and would create a permanent Small Business Financing Corporation within the Federal Reserve System.

#### POSTWAR BUYING BACKLOG

A sign of the times is the new, unadvertised shortage which the U. S. public will soon find in safety deposit boxes. White-collar workers and wage earners clutching War Bonds in their hands have swarmed into banks and trust companies in recent months and rented safety deposit boxes for the first time in their lives. Safety deposit box occupancy is at an all time high; rentals since January 1, are up 31 per cent over their same period a year ago. Yet there is no tendency to hoard currency.

It means greater employment if industry, unhampered by unnecessary governmental restrictions, is given a chance to satisfy the demand.
