A returning soldier, a wounded Marine, tells his own story of how he saved his outfit on Guadalcanal from what would have been disaster, if his presence of mind and early training had not equipped him for the situation. We have before this praised the training received by our Boy Scouts, of how they build character and teach many branches to our boys. This boy became a man and carried with him to a man's war his remembrance of signaling that he learned as a Boy Scout. His platoon became separated from another and no signal man was with this group and the Japs "were all over the place." He offered his knowledge and taking two bayonets and tying handkerchiefs on them for semaphore flags, he sent his message successfully. This former Boy Scout was decorated for extraordinary heroism with our Navy Cross.

STRANGE PARADOXES

When a ship wanders into shoal water and goes aground, the skipper is held responsible. No one thinks of reprimanding the subordinates and giving the captain a medal. When a business is floundering, the Board of Directors and stockholders look for a new President. But, they say, it is Hopkins, and Elmer Davis, and McNutt, and Wallace, and Byrnes who are responsible. Don't blame the President. He really doesn't want to run for the Presidency again.

STALE BREAD

Rather than waste stale bread in these days when we're pledged to "waste nothing." Wrap bread in a clean, damp towel for about a minute. Then place in 350 deg oven for about 20 to 25 minutes. Serve warm.

PRACTICALLY FOOLPROOF
To prevent white sauce from lumping, don't allow flour and fat to become too hot before adding the milk. Stir about 1/2 cup of milk in very slowly as sauce thickens, then gradually add the balance of the milk and stir until it all thickens.
