**RATION BOOK REMINDER**

**RATION BOOK NO. 3—RED STAMPS—** October 30—Expiration date of brown stamps C, D, E and F in ration book No. 3, C valid on Sept. 26, D on Oct. 3, E on October 10 and F on Oct. 17. November 20—Blue stamps X, Y Z valid from October 1 to November 20. **SUGAR—** August 16—Sugar stamp No. 14, book No. 1, good for five pounds. October 31—Canning sugar stamps No. 15, 16 in book No. 1, each good for five pounds, expire. Housewives may apply at local boards for supplemental home canning rations, if essential. **BLUE STAMPS—** October 20—Expiration date of blue stamps U, V, and W in book No. 2 (processed fruits and vegetables.) **GASOLINE—** November 21—Expiration date stamps No. 8 in A book (four gallons each). **SHOES—** Stamp No. 18 in book 1, originally scheduled to expire October 31, is extended indefinitely to provide for an overlap period. Families may pool stamps. May 1—Stamp No. 1 on airplane sheet in book No. 3 valid for one pair of shoes from November 1 until May 1, 1944. **TIRE INSPECTION—** A card autos every 6 months or by September 30 (inspections) must be at least 90 days apart.) B card autos every 4 months or by October 31 (inspections) must be at least 60 days apart.) C card autos every 3 months or by Nov. 30 (inspection must be at least 45 days apart.) Commercial vehicles every six months or every 5000 miles, whichever occurs first. **RATION BOOK NO. 4—** Nation wide registration for war ration book No. 4 is slated for October 29 to November 1. **STOVES—** Purchase certificates obtainable at local ration board. **WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL** Fuel dealers must deliver wood, sawdust and coal on priority based on consumer need, with those having less than three months' supply coming first. **SURPLUS MARETS—** Portland Farmer-Consumer Markets: Open 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. No. 1—Monday and Thursday—NE 33d ave. and Skidmore st. No. 2—Tuesday and Friday, SW 18 ave. and Jefferson st. No. 3—Wednesday and Saturday, SE 28th ave. and Powell.
